STRAWBERRIES PUT ON MARKET

High Prices Are Held Likely
For Some Time Due to
California Frost

First shipments of strawberries in more than two years are being received by local wholesalers, with the price quoted reaching \$5.00. Although only a few crates have been received so far, heavier shipments may be expected soon. Reports of heavy damage to the berry crop in California mean that the price will probably continue high for some time. Portland shared a car shipped last week from Louisiana.

The onion market has furnished the unsteady element on the market this week, with local growers reluctant to let their holdings go at even \$4.18 per hundred. Prices from the wholesalers were listed yesterday at \$5.50 on the No. 1's and \$3.50 on the No. 2's and bollings. Prospects are for higher prices. A car of Oregon onions shipped to Seattle earlier in the week left the car at \$5.15 a hundred.

Local rhubarb is becoming more plentiful, with nearly every store handling it. The price varies, a fair medium being three pounds for 23 cents.

Asparagus also is increasing in quantity.

Asparagus is also coming in in larger quantities, the price running about 20 cents a pound, or two pounds for 35 cents. The Washington deal is getting well under way. California has been shipping for some days.

Tomatoes are up 50 cents wholesale this week, to \$6.00. The supply is scarce, due to the fact that shipments out of Mexico are difficult now with the war-fare stopping transportation. Texas tomatoes are expected to be rolling in another week, which is expected to relieve the temporary shortage. So far as Salem is concerned, the demand does not equal the supply at the present time—not with prices so high.

Other Vegetables

Prices Are Steady
The root and bunch vegetable markets remain steady, except that radish receipts are not large.

New peas, shipped in from California, are 13 cents a pound, wholesale, a drop of four cents over last week. Green beans are also way down over the previous figure of 25 cents. They are leaving the warehouses at 15 cents this week.

Orange prices continue low with supply plentiful. The low price of oranges has tended to keep the apple steady, instead of sending the price up as is usual at this time of the year. Bananas, lemons and grapefruits are also holding the same prices.

PRISON ESCAPE IS TAKEN AT HOQUIAM

Charles M. Burchette, who escaped from the Oregon state penitentiary here July 29, 1917, was returned to the institution Thursday from Hoquiam, Wash., where he was arrested on information furnished by Warden Lewis.

Burchette was received at the prison from Multnomah county on March 7 to serve a term of three years for robbery. He escaped while employed on the prison ranch. Since leaving the penitentiary Burchette lost a foot in a train accident. Sol Warden, a guard returned Burchette here from Hoquiam.

Butter and Egg Prices Are Steady

Butter and egg conditions have remained generally steady this week. Eggs are higher than last week at 19 cents to 23 cents, the latter price for the extras. Butterfat is 44 cents.

So far as Salem producers are concerned, the storage deal is off for some time, as the demand for eggs is just about up with the supply. One dealer remarked yesterday that more eggs are being hatched this year than for several seasons, which accounts in part for the steady market. Egg prices, under these circumstances, are liable to go higher.

WHEAT PRICES SHOW SLUMP

Quotations Back to \$1.02
and \$1 After Serious
Setback This Week

The wheat market experienced the biggest slump in a long period when the price dropped four cents early this week and after fluctuating a cent or so was again back Thursday at \$1.02 on the white and \$1.00 on the red.

Local millers attribute the present condition to two factors, chief of which is the president's message to congress, Hoover declaring in his farm relief stand that it was not the government policy to set itself in business to regulate

prices. Immediately after the big drop came. A large amount of wheat has been sold lately, which has had some influence in bringing the price down.

At the present time there is some outlook that the Russian situation may have some bearing on the market condition in this country, as a big storage of wheat is evident in Russia, where the people are on a bread ration. If Russia is forced to buy on the world market, the surplus will be taken down materially which in turn will strengthen prices. The wheat surplus in Canada is now 22,000,000 bushels more than a year ago, which may tend to balance even Russian demands. The winter kill in the old country was not so great as at first expected. Following a drop in the demand for spring oats now that seeding is over, gray oats here being quoted at 60 cents, the same figure as the white.

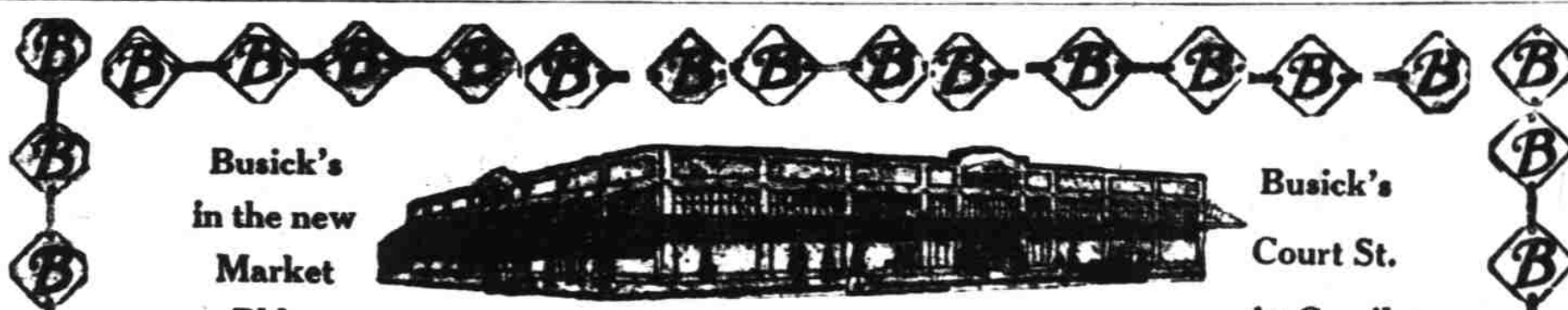
