NEW YORK, April 24.—(AP) -Bull forces made a vigorous effort to gain complete control of the stock market today, but found traders highly nervous and quick to take profits at higher levels. Selling swept the market in such volume toward the close that the Associated Press index of 50 industrials recorded a loss for the day of 3 points. Total sales crossed the 4,000,000 share mark for the third time this month.
