

Dallas Men Planning For Twilight Baseball League

6 TEAMS WILL PLAY IN GAMES

New Stadium Provided for Nines; Commission of Five, Managers

DALLAS, April 27.—The managers of the Twilight League baseball teams met at the Gayle hotel for lunch Friday to make plans for the coming season. It was decided that a commission of five men not connected with any team would be appointed to take charge of the affairs of the league.

The six teams participating this year are the American Legion, Firemen, Woodmen, Farmers, Mill, and the Clerks. Professional and Business men's team. The first game of the season will probably be played May 13, and season tickets will be sold for \$1 to help defray expenses. The new stadium is now completed and will furnish plenty of good seats for everyone this year.

A great deal of interest is being shown by the boys of Dallas in the Junior baseball league which has been organized by Carl B. Fenton post of the American Legion under the direction of Jack Hayes, Ralph Beck, and Jack Eakin. More than 150 boys under the age of 17 have signed up and they will be divided into teams so that every one will get a chance to play. 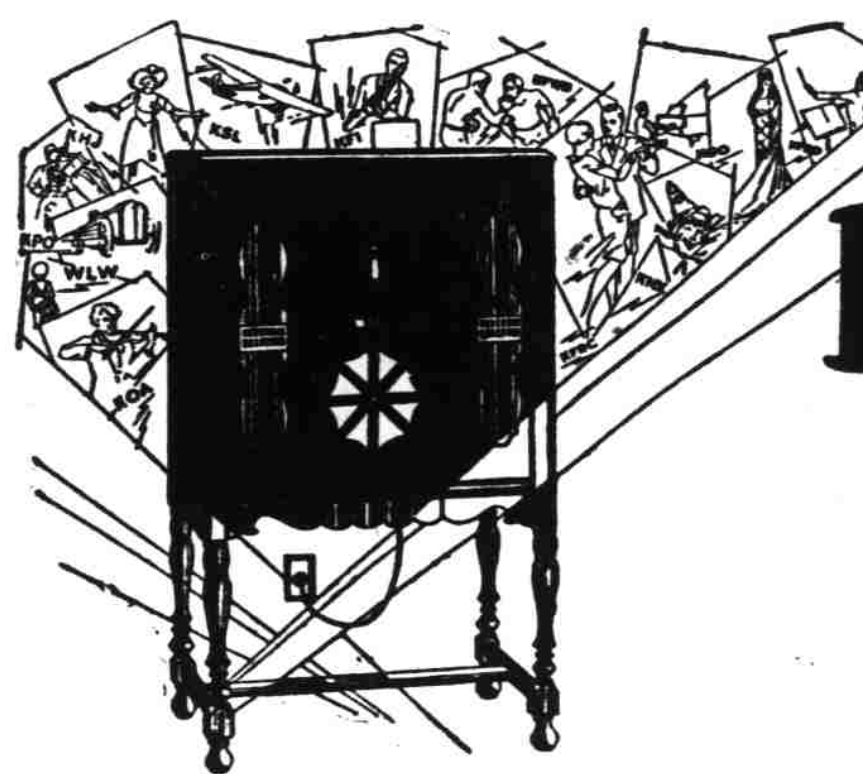
