

Lincoln Community Club Revels in Old Time Memories

'BUGLE' OF 30 YEARS REVIVED

Salem Citizens Go Out To Partake In Celebration In Old Village

LINCOLN, April 30.—A rousing meeting for old timers of Lincoln was held to a full house Friday night, April 26 at the Lincoln community club. A general invitation had been issued to old Lincoln residents for this meeting to hear the reading of "The Bugle," a paper edited by the Lincoln Literary society almost 30 years ago.

Special guests were Col. and Mrs. Carl Abrams and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Boehringer and two children, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Spong and John Boehringer all of Salem and Mr. and Mrs. Walter Gerth of West Salem.

The opening number on the program was a musical selection on the piano, "Ramona," and encore "Avalon Town," by Mrs. Marie Flint McCall, talented musician, humorous reading "What's the Matter"—Marion Walling, musical comedy in four acts, "Jack Spunkus up Courage," "Sparkin' Peggy Jane," "Wedding" of Jack and Peggy Jane and the "Honeymoon."

Principals are Good. The principal characters were played by Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Scott as "Jack" and "Peggy Jane" and Mr. Roy Barker took the part of the minister. The cast proved themselves to be finished actors. Mrs. Marie Flint McCall accompanied on the piano; a piano solo—"Long, Long Ago" was given by the youthful musician, Carlton Boehringer, humorous reading, "The Bugle," and encore "Brand New Auto" by Elaine Worthington, saxophone and piano duo—"Waiting" and encore, Schubert's "Serenade," Marjorie and Ellis Walling.

Boehringer in Charge. Frank Boehringer was requested to act forward and take charge of the program. Mr. Boehringer recalled many amusing incidents which happened when he was a boy in Lincoln. He then called on Carl Abrams to read an issue of "The Bugle." This proved to be interesting to old timers and newcomers alike. The alphabet included names of many present and was very good; other quips and jokes were much enjoyed also.

Lines on Editorial. In closing Mr. Abrams read the editorial of "The Bugle," and then told of an experience which he had during the war while in Dublin, Ireland. Mr. Boehringer said that Mr. Abrams was too modest to read some of the articles in the paper and he proceeded to do so.

The assembly was kept in a perfect gale of mirth throughout the reading of the paper. An excellent poem "Constancy" written by Mr. J. R. Shepard was read, J. M. Spong was next called and gave a short talk as did R. C. Shepard.

Walter Gerth upon being called upon made a few remarks and then gave a splendid reading, "Cremation of Sam McGee."

Abrams Editor. The editorial staff of "The Bugle," was comprised of Editor-in-chief, Carl Abrams, associate editors, Miss Kate Ridings, Ralph C. Shepard, Zena and Frank Boehringer, Lincoln, business manager, J. M. Spong.

Secretary of the Lincoln Community club, E. E. Buckles, expressed appreciation for those who gave time and talent to make this meeting a memorable one. Frank Boehringer and J. M. Spong pleased very much with a bone rattling and mouth harp act.

Gerth Calls Quadrille. Walter Gerth was prevailed upon to call the numbers of a quadrille in the way he did 30 years ago. Mr. Boehringer said that Lincoln was a very enterprising place at that time, boasting a church, flouring mill, grist mill, grain storehouse in which as high as 350,000 bushels of wheat had been stored at one time, a general merchandise store with wharf in conjunction, lumber mill and blacksmith shop.

A pot luck supper was served after the program by the committee. Mrs. D. R. Rubie, Mrs. E. E. Buckles, Mrs. Tracy Walling and Mrs. Alvin Walling. At the business meeting which preceded the program, it was voted to discontinue the Lincoln community club until the fourth Friday in October, the present officers to hold over until that time.
