Frances Grote Is Heard in Recital

Frances Grote, deaf pianist, was presented in recital at the Y. W. C. A. Tuesday evening by Mrs. Mollie Hill Styles. Ralph Patterson, baritone, accompanied by Miss Minnie Miller, assisted on the program.

The young student presented, deaf since infancy, played a remarkable program. Historical qualities, his sympathetic interpretation of subject and mood, and his fine sensitiveness seemed incredible when one considered that to do this work he had to depend upon having been taught and upon an innate sense of rhythm and musical appreciation. Not to be able to enter the exact tones for which one strove except through a sense of feel and of habits established through teaching would require patience and talent beyond the ordinary.

Mrs. Styles has had the sole work of teaching and developing this deaf pianist to the point where he now is and certainly to her much credit is due.

The imagery and beauty of "Scenes from Childhood," Schumann, seemed to catch the fancy of the young pianist, and he interpreted with remarkable ability. The assisting work of Mr. Patterson and Miss Miller was very well received. "On the Road to Mandalay," always a favorite was no exception here.

About 35 million letters have been carried by the air mailmen and 6,000 passengers were given transportation.

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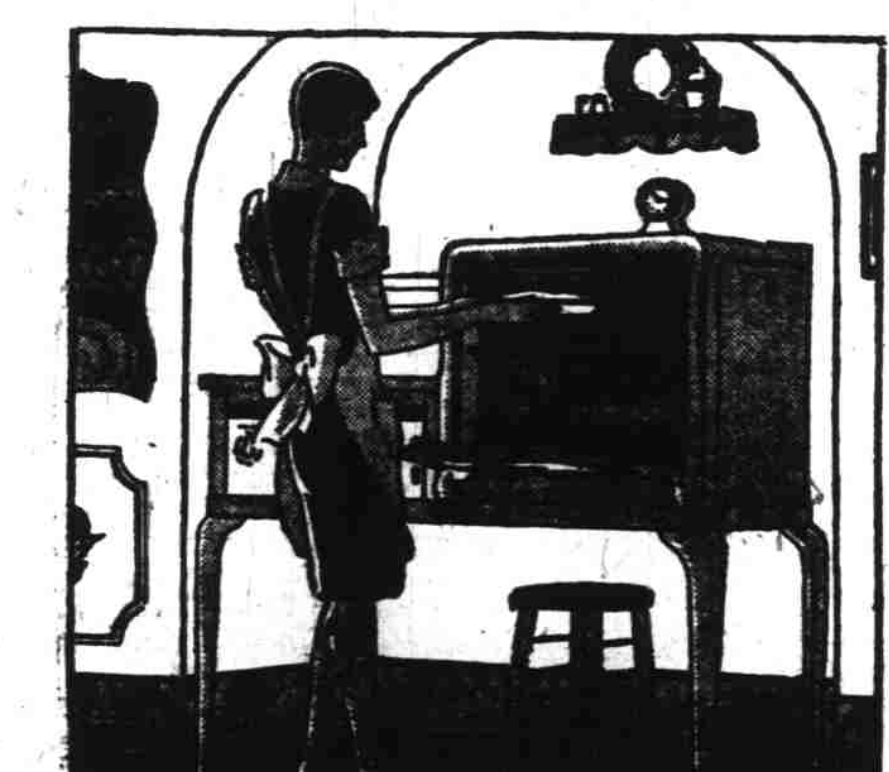
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
