It is urged now that the service clubs take up the idea and each club take a certain responsibility toward getting the museum started. Certainly no better project could be adopted than one to promote the spread of art appreciation and the opportunity to collect and display masterpieces as the property of the city and in its folk.

Efforts have been made in the last few months on the part of individuals and organizations to get individually owned art pieces before the public by loaning to various organizations for short lengths of time. This is unsatisfactory for it makes individual organizations assume the responsibility and the owner assume the risk of loss through accident or otherwise. With a museum of its own the city would be assuming the responsibility and would be spreading one of the finest educational possibilities to its public.

It would be a splendid thing, if when the Salem Art League meets May 14, some organized plan of the various service and civic clubs might be ready to be presented making an art museum for Salem possible.

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BULLS WILL GO WILD IN MART

Outburst of Activity Shown on First Day of Month; Credit is Handicap

NEW YORK, May 1.—(AP)—Bulls began the new month today with such an outburst of activity as the stock market has not experienced since March, but handicapped by continued uncertainty over credit, were unable to move prices substantially higher save in spots.

Total sales of 4,638,900 were the largest in about five weeks, and more than a score of issues were sent up from 3 to nearly 20 points, but there was a rush to take profits which cancelled many gains and depressed much of the list. The Associated Press index of 50 leading industrials recorded a gain of less than a point for the day.

Passage of Money Pinch Causes Rise

The resumption of large scale operations for the advance were predicted upon the passing of the month-end money pinch, and bankers were unable to foresee any prospect of really easy money in the near future. Call money renewed at 11 per cent, against 14 yesterday, but got no lower than 10 per cent, the closing rate of Tuesday.

The New York federal reserve bank, in its monthly bulletin, issued today, indicates that there has been little improvement in the credit situation since the call money crisis of late March. It points out that the reduction in brokers' loans has been in part offset by loans on securities at the banks. Aviation, Chemical and Motor Accessories Are Strong

Chemical, Aviation and Motor Parts and Accessories were in the forefront of the advance. United Aircraft was sent up 15 points in still further punishment of shorts to a record price at 162, but fell back to 152 at the close. Union Carbide was bid up more than 19 points to a record price of 84 1/2. In buying said to be in expectation of large earnings from new products and processes. Electric Auto Lite was sent up 13 points on reports that current earnings are more than double what they were a year ago.

Stromberg Carburator touched a new top at 101 in buying for the privileges of conversion into Bendix Aviation. American Bosch Magneto, Borg Warner, Murray Corp., Western Electrical Instrument and Wilcox Rich issues broke into new high ground. Motors were rather heavy, save for Marmon, which jumped more than 8 points to a new high for the year, and Willys Overland which was bought on large current sales reports. General Motors made a moderate gain in response to April sales reports, but lost it before the close.

HOOVER DISCHARGES FEDERAL ATTORNEY

WASHINGTON, May 1.—(AP)—President Hoover today signed an order dismissing from office William A. Degroot, United States attorney for the eastern district of New York, effective immediately.

The president's order addressed to Degroot is as follows: "You are hereby removed from the office of United States attorney, eastern district of New York, effectively immediately."

The president acted upon the recommendation of Attorney General Mitchell who called for Degroot's resignation and who took the case to the White House after the federal attorney declined to comply with the request.

Regarding Degroot's demand for an investigation before the president acted, Attorney General Mitchell advised Mr. Hoover that Degroot had had a full and complete hearing under former Attorney General Sargent.
