Select Cup Winner—The 1929 winner for the Dr. Henry E. Morris cup for the most outstanding student in the commercial department of the high school, was selected at a meeting of the commercial faculty Wednesday afternoon, but name of the recipient is being withheld until the student assembly Friday morning. A girl is the winner. The cup was first given last year. It is awarded by Dr. Morris to the student outstanding in scholarship, initiative and leadership. The student must be active in the work of the junior chamber of commerce.

Measles Still in Lead—Thirty nine cases of communicable disease were reported in Marion county for the week ending May 4, according to the weekly bulletin of the state department of health just issued. Of this total 24 cases were measles, which also holds the lead in the state, with 23 cases, 98 of which are in Portland. Other diseases reported in this county include tuberculosis, six cases; pneumonia, chickenpox and scarlet fever, one each; mumps, four; and diphtheria, two.

Both these students have done considerable high school journalistic work. Robert Anthony will go up on the same ticket as manager of the paper and Harlan Boels as business manager of the annual. While other names have not been mentioned prominently for these posts, other candidates are expected to develop Friday morning.

Student body secretary, vice-president, song leader, yell king, secretary and athletic manager are among the other offices to which students will be nominated.

STUDENTS WILL NOMINATE SOON

Little Excitement Shown at Salem High on Eve of Political Event

POLLUTION OF RIVER STUDIED

State College and University of Oregon Will Assist, Williams Reports

Organisation of the stream pollution commission of Oregon under the supervision of the state board of health, was furthered at a meeting in Portland Saturday, reports Fred A. Williams, city attorney of Salem, who attended as one of the representatives of the Oregon league of cities.

It was determined that Oregon State College representatives on the commission should have charge of examinations of the waters to be studied; this will include physical, chemical and bacteriological examinations. The state college members will also study the effects of stream pollution on water for domestic and industrial use, bathing, boating and camping.

The representatives of the University of Oregon will study the legislative side; state laws, existing and needed, in the matter of sanitary and industrial wastes, and municipal ordinances, probatory and with relation to the building and maintenance of sewage disposal plants. The financial problems will also be studied by this group.

Control of stream pollution, both the establishing of sewer disposal plants and elimination of industrial wastes, will be the special study of the League of Oregon Cities representatives.

Solons Vote Big Amount In Session

Total appropriations made by the 35th legislative assembly, not including fixed millage tax items, annual and continuing appropriations, aggregated \$7,878,528.78, according to a statement prepared by the secretary of state in reply to requests received from the state grange.

Recommendations for appropriations in the amount of \$7,003,972.15 were submitted to the legislature by Patterson. Net appropriations of the governor provide by the legislature totalled \$6,957,977.33. Additional appropriations approved by the legislature aggregated \$1,012,451.46. The governor vetoed appropriations of \$91,900.

Net total appropriations in addition to the amount recommended by the governor was \$920,551.54.


