Riot By Students Saturday Defended

The cause of the student uprising Saturday was said in the resolution to lie in the fact that "the board of trustees allowed Dr. Shields to summarily dismiss the entire faculty without receiving any report or recommendation whatsoever from the administration knowing that the act would surely jeopardize the credits of the students and would drive the faculty and student body away."

TORONTO, Ont., May 13.—(AP)—The Rev. Dr. T. T. Shields, chairman of the board of trustees of the Des Moines (Iowa) university today said that Dr. H. C. Wayman who was deposed Saturday as president of the institution had shown "absolute lack of discipline and control in administering the affairs of the university."

In a telephone conversation with the Buffalo Evening News, Dr. Shields said the selection of Dr. Wayman as president "was the greatest mistake the university had ever made," although he himself had suggested Wayman's name when the vacancy occurred in the presidential chair at the institution.

Dismissal of Modern Profession Praised

"I believed Dr. Wayman would suit us after I learned he had been instrumental in securing the dismissal of three professors in William Jewell College (Liberty, Mo.) of which he was then president, because of their liberal views," Dr. Shields stated. Instead, he asserted, Dr. Wayman "threw himself into the arms of malcontents and tried to develop trouble for officials who were trying to change the school from a liberal to a Christian institution."

Dr. Shields planned to leave tonight for Buffalo to attend a meeting of the board of trustees of the university. The session will be informal as under the university's constitution, the board cannot meet regularly outside the state of Iowa.

Des Moines university is being reopened against the wishes of the trustees, said Dr. Shields, and marks recently by students who attend classes in disobedience of the order will not be recognized by the board.

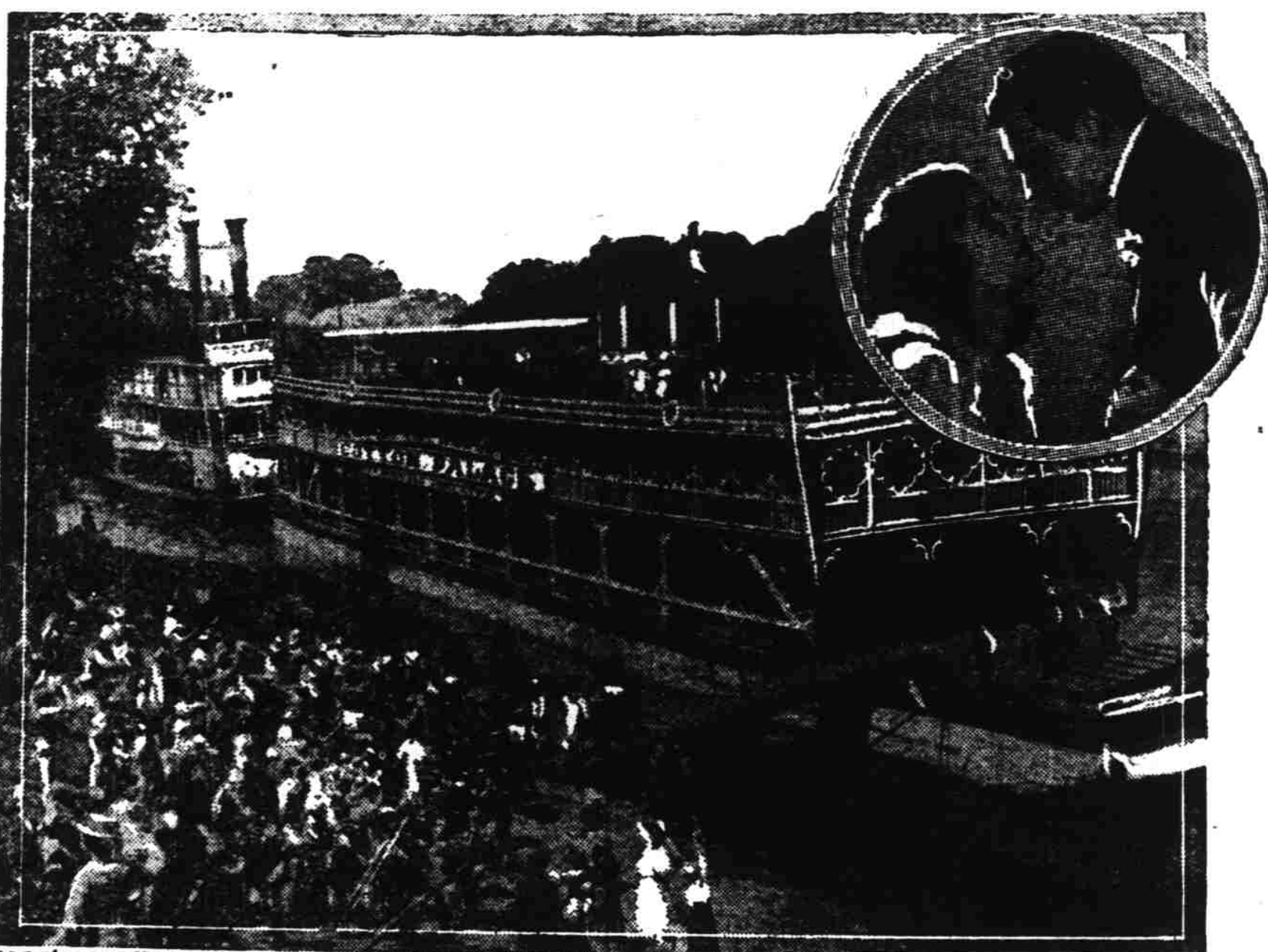

KAY EXPLAINS NEW BUILDING

A five-story state office building, which will have a frontage of 200 feet on Court street and a depth of 97 feet along Waverly avenue and 12th streets, is proposed for the new state office building. Plans are being completed along with specifications to permit contractors to bid on the property within the next few weeks. Construction work can probably be started by June 15.

These are the salient facts about the new building outlined Monday noon to the chamber of commerce by State Treasurer Kay who along with several other citizens took part of an informal program.

Kay explained that the new building would have 22 per cent more floor space than the one for which plans were drawn some months ago and which was rejected because lighting would be impaired for the offices of the supreme court.

James W. Mott told the chamber that the tariff on hops as proposed in the bill now before congress, was not sufficiently high to keep out all foreign importations. He urged the chamber to go on record as in favor of a higher tariff due to the fact that hop growing is a basic industry of the Salem district and should receive the fullest measure of protection.

C. A. Aller reported that the construction work for the new telephone building was being held up until a determination could be decided upon the exact kind of new equipment to be employed in the building.

He intimated that there was some discussion as to whether the present manual system would be installed in the new building, it being possible that the telephone company would use the automatic exchange system. Mr. Aller said his company's expenditures in Salem in the next 20 months would approximate \$900,000. One of the big outlays will be to put wires running through the city and south into large cable containers. These will necessitate a relay station in the office building of the company.

Dr. P. C. Riley of Hubbard extended an invitation to the chamber to lend its support to the community talent contest soon to be begun in Salem. The first night has been set for Friday, May 24, he said, when Salem talent will be featured on the bill.

E. L. Wieder, head of the Salem laundry, made a protest to the chamber on an increase in taxes and allows which is proposed in the pending tariff. He said this would only raise the price to the consumer.

Yank Girls Victors in Net Events

SCHIEVENINGEN, Holland, May 13.—(AP)—The first international tennis contest in the European tennis campaign of Miss Helen Wills and her American team mates ended today in a victory for the invaders over Holland's girl stars by seven matches to two for the three days of play.

All three of today's encounters went to the Americans who had gained a lead of four to two in the Saturday and Sunday matches. Miss Wills produced one of the singles victories, defeating Miss Rollin Conquerque, 6-1, 6-1, and Miss Edith Cross, of San Francisco, accounted for the other victory almost as easily from Miss Canters, 6-2, 6-2. The Californians then paired together to beat Miss Kea Bouman and Miss Conquerque in a hard fought doubles match 6-4, 2-6, 8-6.

Except for defeats by Miss Cross at the hands of Miss Bouman and Miss Conquerque, the Americans were uniformly successful and with the steady presence of Miss Wills the superiority of their team was never in doubt. Miss Marjorie Borrell of Dedham, Mass., played well, winning twice in singles and again in doubles when paired with Miss Cross. Miss Wills also won twice in singles, losing only four games to Holland's two best players, and topped off by aiding in the concluding doubles victory.
