The following schedule of prices to be paid pickers by members was worked out at the meeting: hardships encountered 33 years for picking throughout the seagooseberries, 3-4c and 1/2c bonus son; strawberries, 1c and 1/2 c bonus; raspberries, 2c and 1/2c bc-Loganberry , pickers who carry their carries from the field will receive 1 1/2 c per pound and a 3-4c bonus, while those picking for growers who do that work will receive 1c per pound with 1/2 c bo-

Prices for the picking of other fruits and berries are to be decided later in the season, as the market is still rather uncertain.
