ranted abridgement of individual rights and that Salem has not yet become so metropolitan that any such prohibition is necessary. Persons who have been accustomed to keeping chickens are the principal objectors.

Principal provisions of the ordinance are:
"It shall be unlawful to pasture, or stake out or allow any horse, cow, mule, sheep, swine, goat, chicken, goose, duck, or rabbit to be pastured or kept in any enclosed or unenclosed lot or tract of land in the city of Salem, Oregon, without the written consent of the owner or owners of the adjoining property within 200 feet, exclusive of streets, from the place it is desired to pasture such stock, being first obtained.

Animals Must Be Kept From Public Places

"It shall be unlawful to permit any (of the animals or fowls named) to run at large or to be herded or staked in any of the streets, alleys, parks, unenclosed private grounds or public places in the city of Salem, excepting when being driven through for shipment or other purpose as by ordinance provided; or to permit the same to stand in any such places unless attended by a person capable of controlling such animal or animals or unless securely fastened with a rope . . . or to permit any such animals to go or stand upon any sidewalk or park . . . or to be staked or fastened on any unenclosed grounds in such manner that such animals can reach the sidewalk or street bordering such grounds.

"It shall be the duty of the street commissioner to take up and impound any domestic animal or animals or fowl or fowls running at large or being herded on the streets, alleys, parks or other public places within the city limits.

"The owner or person having charge of any animal or fowl described in section 1 of this ordinance who shall violate the provisions hereof, shall upon conviction before the city recorder, be fined not less than \$5 or more than \$50 for each offense, or be imprisoned in the city jail not exceeding ten days or by both such fine and imprisonment. Each day that a violation of this ordinance continues shall be considered a separate offense."

Mr. Morrow resigned his membership in the Morgan banking firm when he accepted appointment as ambassador to Mexico.

Meanwhile the Morrow party stayed close to the fire-side of the spacious house while a northeastern wind drove an almost steady rain over this little island just off the Maine coast.

It was the second anniversary of Lindbergh's flight to Paris.

The amphibian cabin plane in which the party flew here from New York remained in front of the house.

States harbor. Some of these vessels, he said, landed their cargoes within 100 yards of the United States customs offices in the city where they docked.

Dry Agents Actually Help Unload Cargo

"It took them three hours to unload, very often," he said, left a Canadian port for a United States port. "They were actually assisted by officers of the 'dry squad' on occasions."

Mr. Euler read a letter from a Canadian collector of national revenue in Ontario, which said that "if the shoe were on the other foot," Canada would quickly tie up the liquor carrying vessels.

Mr. Euler cited many things which he said Canada had done to assist the United States in enforcing its liquor laws—Canada had agreed to the twelve mile limit treaty; officials give information as to clearances for United States ports; the government insists upon bonds for liquor laden vessels entering Canadian ports; the export houses which formerly shipped to the United States had been closed; the provincial authorities were the only ones permitted to import intoxicants, and the number of liquor export docks had been greatly reduced, he said, adding that when liquor is exported to the United States the duty is paid.
