

HONOR WILL BE PAID SOLDIERS

Parade Downtown to be Followed by Program Held in Armory Here

The parade will form on North Commercial street with its head at Chemeketa facing south and will march south on Commercial to Court, east on Court to Church, south on Church to State; west on State to Liberty, south on Liberty to the armory and dishband. Automobiles containing members of the G. A. R., W. R. C. and War Mothers will drive past the armory in three columns and halt before unloading passengers. For the placing of wreaths on the War Mothers' Memorial monument and accompanying ceremonies, the parade will halt when its head reaches the corner of High and State streets. Section three will turn right on High street and High Court and will fill the block on High between State and Court streets in order to surround the court house square on four sides.

When the parade is halted for the monument ceremony the American Legion drum corps and the firing squad will be marched from section two to the monument to participate in the ceremonies and immediately upon completion of the ceremonies will resume their places. Section three will hold fast on High street until the end of section crosses the intersection of State and High street whereupon section three will resume its original marching place.

Reviewing Stand
At Bank Building
The reviewing stand will be located at the First National bank on Liberty street. Reviewing officers will be commanders of G. A. R., S. W. V., Veterans Foreign and American Legion masters. Each organization is requested to keep its place in line past the reviewing stand and will not be disbanded until arrival at the armory. All organizations are further urged to enter the armory in a body and attend the Memorial day exercises.

The parade will form in three sections. Section one, commanded by Capt. Clifford Irwin, O. N. G., will form on Marion street with its head at Commercial, facing west. Section two, commanded by Capt. B. F. Pound, will form on Commercial street with its head at Marion street facing south. Section three, commanded by Karl Steiwer, will form on Marion street with its head at Commercial facing east.

The order of the parade will be as follows:
First section: 1. Colors; 2. Honorary grand marshal, grand marshal, staff and reserve officers; 3. Salem Military Band; Company B, Coast Artillery Det. Oregon National Guard; 6. Medical corps Det. O. N. G.

Second section: 1. Sedgewick Post G. A. R. in automobiles escorted by Sons of Veterans; 2. Woman's Relief Corps ladies of the G. A. R. and War Mothers in automobiles; 3. Spanish War veterans and auxiliary; 4. Veterans of Foreign Wars and auxiliary; 5. American Legion and auxiliary; 6. Auxiliary Sons of Veterans and Daughters of Veterans.

Third section: 1. Salem Indian school band; 2. Salem Indian school battalion; 3. Salvation Army; 4. Boy Scouts; 5. Camp Fire Girls; 6. Civic and fraternal organizations.

This combination of events was taken by the observers to indicate that arrangements for today's ceremony were made immediately after the ambassador arrived here. When the ambassador stepped from his train at Newark yesterday, efforts were made to obtain some indication of the wedding date but to all queries he courteously replied that he had "nothing to say." He drove with Mrs. Morrow and their daughter Constance from Newark to his estate here and from the time of his arrival no word was forthcoming from the home until formal announcement of the wedding was made late today.

Huge Filing Safe Built High School

Records of students, past and present, at the Salem high school stand little future danger of being destroyed, what with the installation Monday of a one-ton filing safe to house the scholastic data. Heretofore the records have been filed in a wooden case and would, of course, be readily lost if fire should make forays in the principal's office where they are kept. The new safe is built to withstand heat of 1,700 degrees for a period of four hours. Records housed in it reach back to the building of the present high school in 1905. At the present enrollment of the school, the new cabinet, in which the old wooden one has been placed, will not accommodate more than three or four more years' files.

SUMMER SCHOOL FOR WEAK STUDENT PLAN

Miss Cosper to Direct Session for Summer With Normal's Help

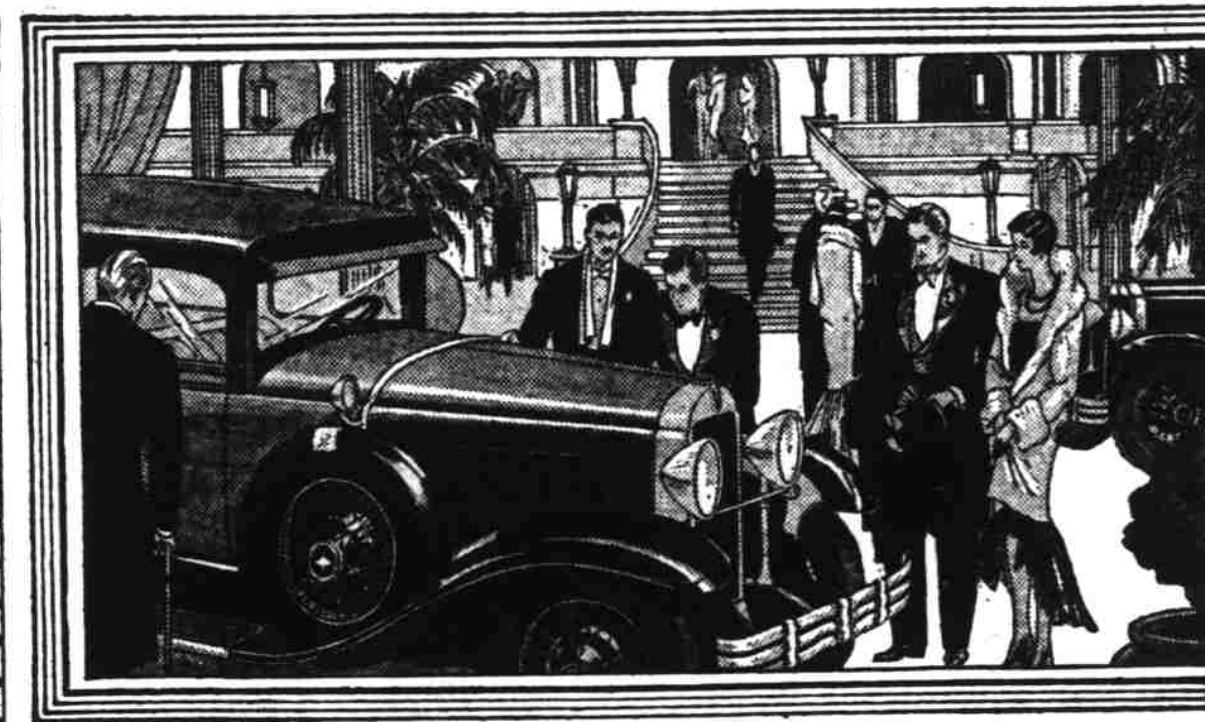
