ENTIRE CORPS IS NOW READY

Many Changes Made in Staff of Schools; Kramer to Coach Athletes

SILVERTON, May 27.—Jean Arthur Lambert of Joliet, Montana, has been elected to succeed Edwin Tingstad as principal of the senior high school in Silverton.

Mr. Lambert is a graduate of the Annapolis United States naval academy, and has had four years of teaching in Howe, Indiana, and four years as principal of the high school in Joliet, Mont.

In addition to Mr. Lambert, ten other new teachers have been engaged. Herman J. Kramer of La Grande, will fill the position of athletic coach and teacher of physical education, left vacant by the resignation of Jerry Gunther. Kenneth Vannice of Halsey, a graduate of the Willamette university, will have charge of the science department, and will also act as coach to the junior high school boys.

Miss Susie Bonner of Silverton has been elected principal of the Park grade school of Salem. Miss Bonner has been teaching English in the Leslie Junior high during this year.

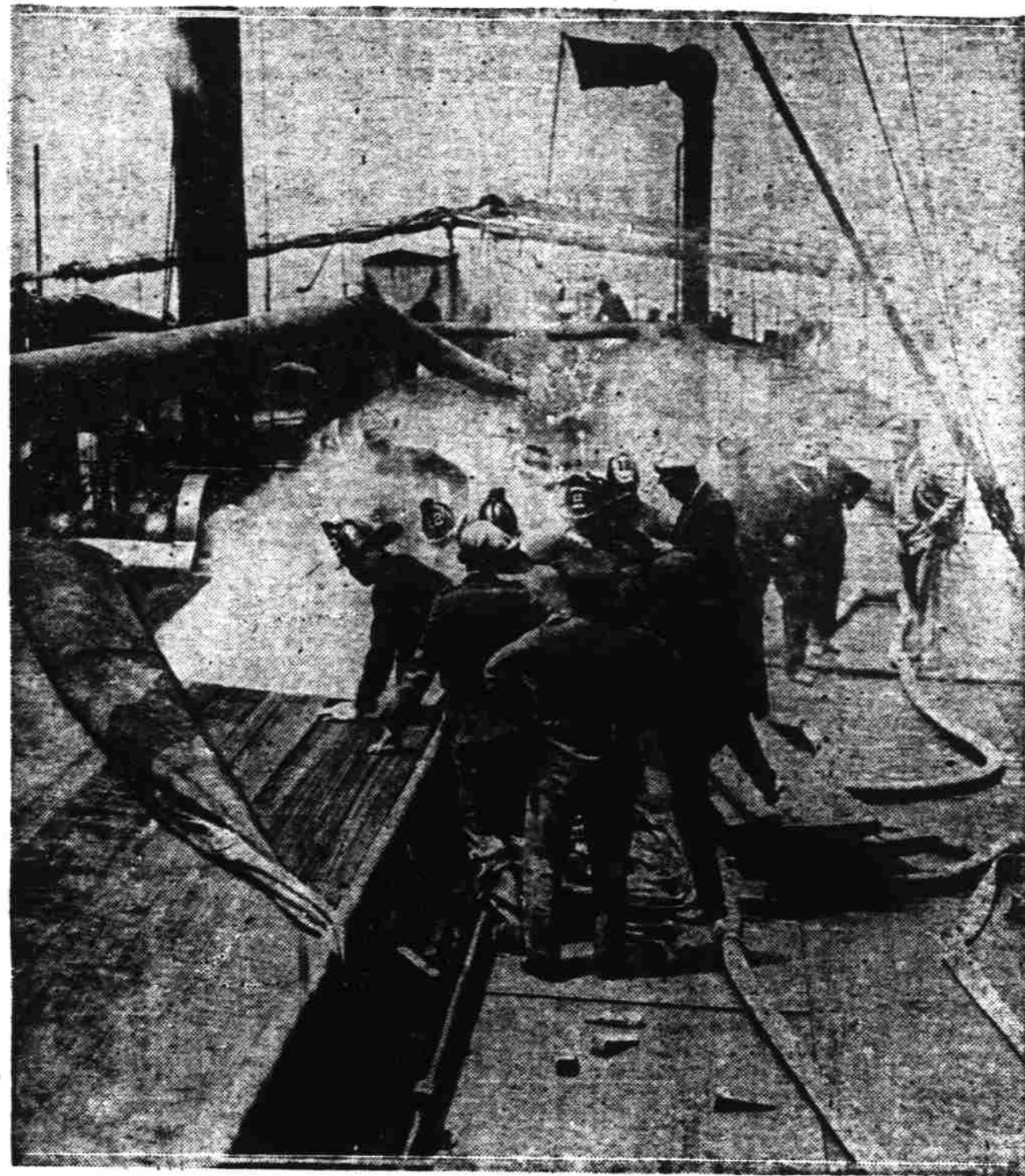
BANQUET FOR CLASS GIVEN AT JEFFERSON

Prize-Winning Teacher Its Instructor

MISS DANIEL IS MODEST

VALSETZ, May 28.—The pupils of the third and fourth grades are very proud of their practice teachers, who are with them this last six weeks of school. Especially Miss Carmen Daniel of La Grande, Ore. Miss Daniel is only seventeen years of age. She is a very modest young lady and a little strategy was used to get her to reveal some of the honors and rewards she has received for doing club work. The first thing to announce is that Miss Carmen Daniel is champion club girl of the United States, having won that honor in Washington, D. C., last summer where she was received as a guest by President and Mrs. Coolidge.

She has received 17 head of registered Holsteins valued at \$5000 and 27 loving cups.

Under the head of ribbons, Miss Daniel's collection consists of 48 purple (grand champion), 149 blues, 38 reds and one white. She is champion girl in United States Holstein calf club. For four years she has been champion club girl of Union county, Oregon; state

champion girl for two years. Miss Daniel has served on the judging and demonstration teams for Union county. She has also received and enjoyed two trips to Chicago, Ill., three to Oregon State fair, four to Oregon State college summer school, two to Pacific International stock show, a trip to Crater Lake and one to Washington, D. C., and this September a trip to Boston, Mass., will also be enjoyed. Miss Daniel has earned a four-year scholarship to Oregon State college, given by the Union Pacific Railroad Co.

However she is saving this for future use and is at present attending the Oregon State Normal school because she wants to teach grade school boys and girls. Upon her return from Boston this fall, Miss Daniel will begin work in a one room rural school in Union county.
