Friend Dies When Cleveland Hospital Burns—Woman Heir

MONMOUTH, May 23.—Mrs. Belle McKnight learned this week that the wife of a close friend, Dr. Carl Helwig, of Cleveland, Ohio, was one of the victims of the recent hospital disaster. Mrs. Helwig was employed as nurse care the doomed building, and was serving her last day on duty there. Dr. Helwig, who was professionally occupied in another hospital in the city, rushed to the scene to give assistance, and as he bent over a prostrate woman discovered her to be his wife. Despite his frenzied efforts for resuscitation she expired in a few minutes.

The Helwigs had planned to locate in the new building where their parents reside, to make their permanent home.
