

HOOVER WANTS NO MORE WAR

President Expresses Regret at Present Prospect of Added Armaments

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duction. And in that connection he expressed deep regret that in spite of the Kellogg-Briand pact to renounce war as an instrument of national policy and the lessons of the great war the nations are engaged in strengthening their naval armaments.

If the Kellogg-Briand covenant be genuine proof that the world has renounced war as an instrument of national policy, Mr. Hoover said this means at once an abandonment of the aggressive use of arms by every national signatory to the pact and "becomes a sincere declaration that all armament hereafter shall be used only for defense."

"Consequently if we are honest," he added, "we must reconsider our own naval armament and the armaments of the world in the light of their defensive and not their aggressive use."

Actual Reductions
Declared Necessary
After twice emphasizing that adequate preparedness "for the protection of our own people" is the only assurance against aggression, the president called attention that that United States has undertaken to approach the problem of naval disarmament with a new program, calling for actual reductions in existing commitments in place of a building up to specific limitations.

Calling attention that his administration has presented a new yard stick to measure relative naval strength, the president declared that to say that such a measure could not be found "is the counsel of despair, it is a challenge to the naval authorities of the world, it is a condemnation of the world to the slaphash toll of competitive armaments."

CIRCUIT RIDER GIVEN HONORS

Local Pastor Gives Memorial Day Address at Capitol Grounds

A stirring message of the days of the pioneers and the lonely journeys of the circuit riders was given by the Rev. W. C. Kantner Thursday in a memorial service at the statue of the Circuit Rider. He declared that the rising generation may profitably be instructed in the lore of the contribution of these messengers to western civilization.

"The circuit riders might well claim to be of the angelic succession as others claim to be of the apostolic succession," Rev. Kantner declared. "The angels were messengers of good tidings, and the circuit riders were also the carriers of good news." His first year in Oregon, he saw service as a circuit rider himself. His district had over a dozen points of call between the upper Santiam valley and Wheatland.

The Kings' Valley district had been settled for several years before Rev. Kantner came to Oregon, but the first funeral service was held when he made his first visit to that country. As Barn-

abas of old had been named the son of Consolation, so the circuit riders might be named the sons of Barnabas, he asserted.

"As that lone grave in the Arlington cemetery is a symbol of supreme devotion to a great cause, so is this statue of the Circuit Rider a symbol of devotion to a similar great cause. This is a monument to the soldiers of the Cross," he said in a final dramatic address to the statue itself.

The services at the statue as well as those at the grave of Jason Lee were in charge of the Kimball School of Theology. The program at the statue was opened by singing "America," and the reading of a memorial poem by Mrs. F. G. Franklin. Following prayer by Dr. Norman K. Tully, President Canse introduced Rev. Kantner. Following the address services were dismissed until the meeting at the grave of Jason Lee. The program continued with the hymn, "Faith of our Fathers"; prayer, Dr. F. C. Taylor; a brief memorial address by

President John M. Canse; floral tribute by Dr. H. A. Hammond, assisted by members of the Jason Lee Epworth League.

miles over an area of considerable width wherein every living thing would be totally destroyed."

Libby read excerpts from press reports of the recent Cleveland disaster to illustrate how completely poison gas would annihilate life.

Failure of the United States to enter the league of nations after sponsoring the idea, failure as yet to enter the world court and marked increase in our navy immediately following ratification of the Kellogg pact, all have aroused international suspicion of the United States, Libby declared.

Four definite steps should be taken by the federal government as a means of stemming any international feeling that this is a militaristic nation, said Libby. He said the policies were those recently advocated by Charles Evans Hughes. First, the United States should enter the world court under the Root formula. Second, the Pan-American treaties of arbitration and conciliation should all be ratified. Third, reduction of armament should be carried out as outlined by Hugh Gibson at the Geneva meeting while as a fourth step some plan of action following a violation of a covenant, such as the Kellogg pact, should be agreed upon.

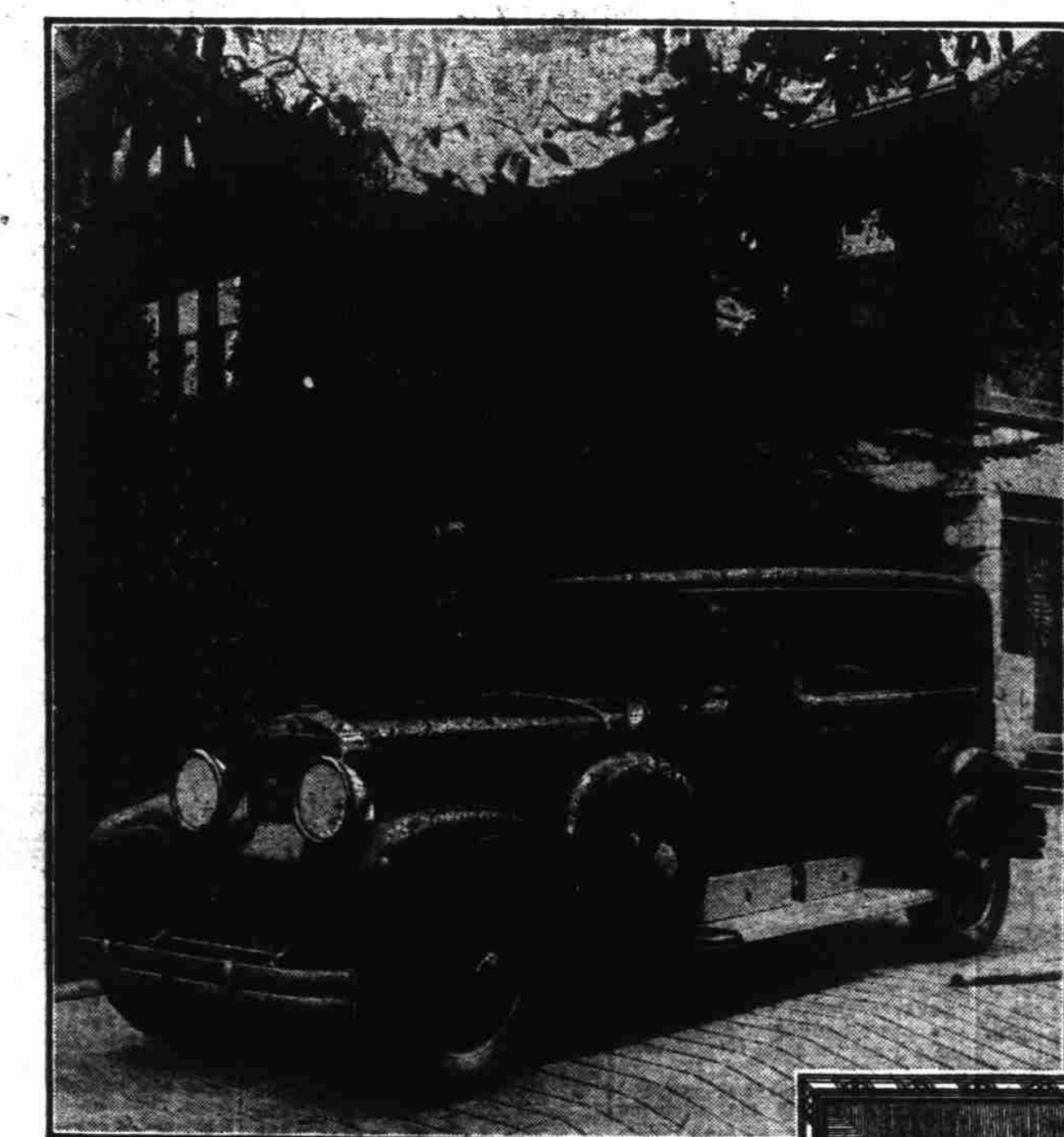

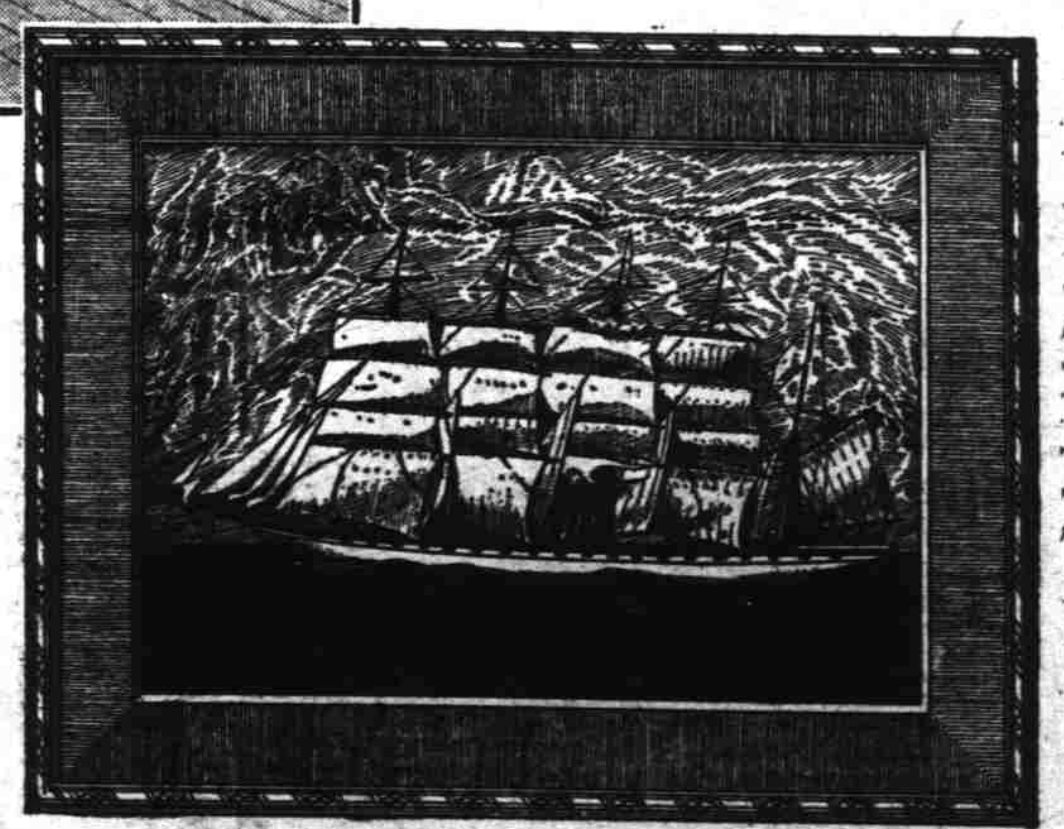
