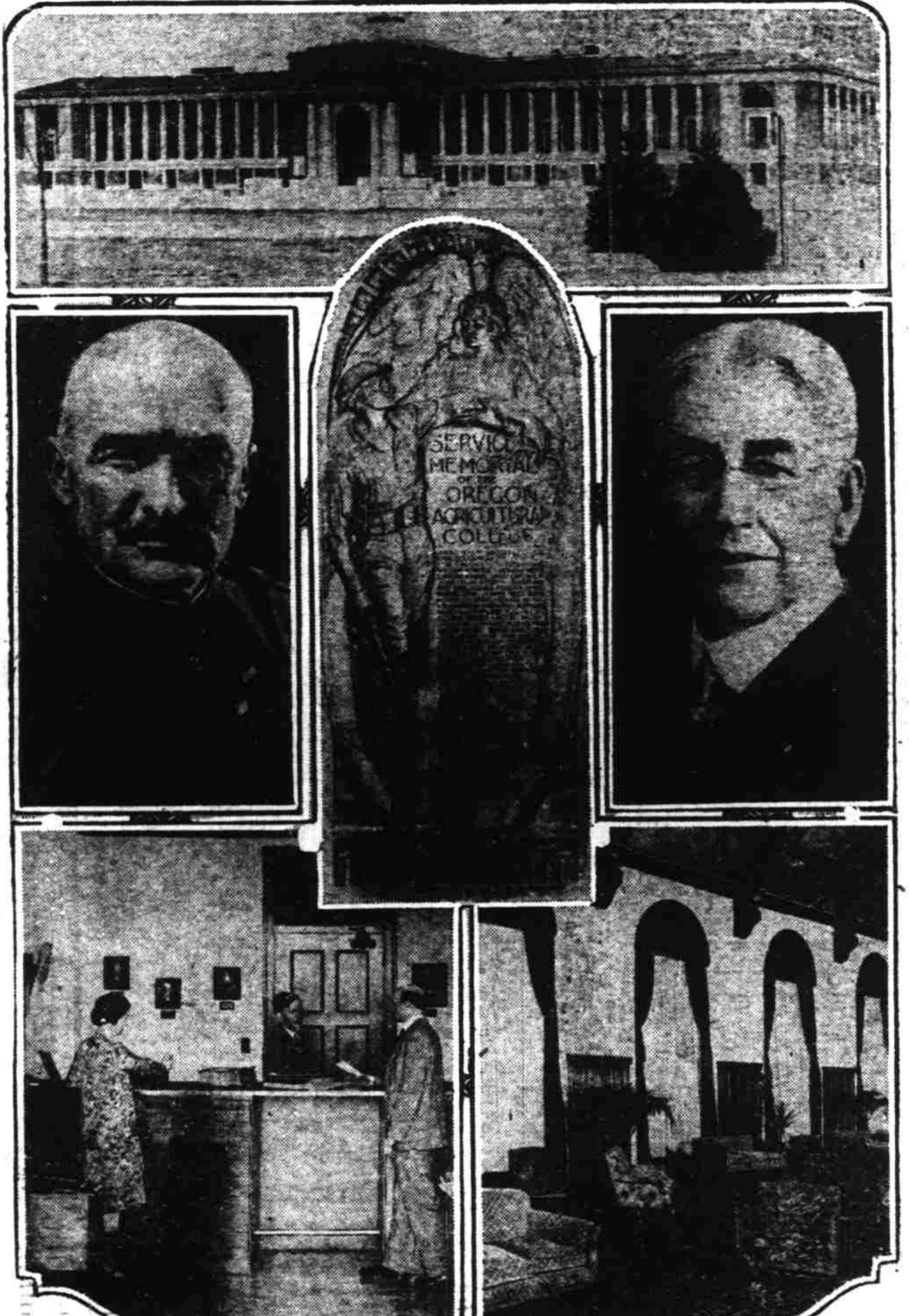
High School To Hear Sermon on Life Investment
