## PRINCIPAL ATTACKS SMALL STORE IDEA

The existence of small stores and eating houses in the vicinity of the high school is not conducive to the best interest of the school, J. C. Nelson, principal, asserts in his report of the year 1928-29, submitted to the city school superintendent. This comment was attached to the statement that "the practice of smoking on the grounds which caused considerable criticism last year, has been carefully watched, and practically stopped."

The chief need of the school now is a larger assembly room, Mr. Nelson reports. At least 200 pupils must stand at every assembly, which condition makes it difficult to secure undivided attention. If the school grows at the present rate, more space will be needed in another two years and if this is secured by addition of a wing, Mr. Nelson suggests that the gymnasium be transferred to the first floor.

Accomplishments for the year included in the annual report are improvement of the 14th street athletic field; introduction of the activity period; remodeling of the auditorium stage; introduction of the basket system for the gymnasium; and guarding of lockers through the efforts of the Girls' League.
