## New Filtration Beds to be Placed in Operation in Next Few Days

on in order to supplement the pressure as well as to improve the quality of water in North Salem, the pressure being low there because of friction in the long pipe line which serves that part of the city, so far distant from the reservoir.

**Unpleasant Taste To Be Eliminated**

These two projects are expected to remedy the bad taste and odor which have featured the water supply since last November. Much improvement has already been made, but the new filtration beds, company officials say, will remove the unsatisfactory conditions entirely.

The construction of filtration beds on Minto Island is merely a temporary remedy, to provide acceptable water until an approved mechanical filter can be erected. This elaborate system will be located on the west bank of the river and the pipe line to the reservoir will cross the river at the intercounty bridge. The reservoir will also be enlarged.

Fator was astride R. Spreckles' Tuskegee as he beat the favorite in the Hemstedt highweight handicap to reward his backers at 6 to 1. In the fifth race Fator was up on Kai Fong, a 10 to 1 shot from the Rancocas stable, and again Fator led the field home, beating a large field in which M. P. Whitney's strongly backed Crazy Coot was the public choice.

Although riding two winners on the card, Malben's big triumph came in the coaching club American Oaks, a 10 to 1 shot for three year old fillies at a mile and three-eighths. Up on Sweet Verberna, Malben rode the Lone Star stable to a head victory over Mrs. F. Ambrose Clark's Aquastella and the supporters of Sweet Verberna received six to one. Malben's second victory ride was on Ruby Keller in the closing event—a win which was worth 4 to 1 to backers of J. V. McGovern's four year old filly.

He concluded, however, that peace between Italy and the holy see would last because of his own faith in the fidelity and the good will of men, but above all because of his "greater faith in the help of God."

The pope reasserted the primordial claim of the Catholic church to supervise the education of youth and the church's pre-eminence in Italy as the state religion.

**Denial Made That State Encroached On**

He stoutly defended the church from any imputation of encroachment upon the legitimate sovereignty of the state, but insisted that the church's rights must be scrupulously respected.
