

West Salem Decides to Furnish S. P. Franchise

BUSY COUNCIL SESSION HELD

Cooperation Voted for Community Club Festival
June 15 to 13

WEST SALEM, June 5.—The council met in regular session on Monday evening in the city hall with Mayor Green presiding and all members present. The street commissioner reported that all street improvements had been finished with the exception of graveling Cascade Drive. Street Commissioner Ruge was ordered to have all streets and vacant lots mowed. It was voted to do away with the old ordinance pertaining to peddlers' license and a new ordinance was voted to charge all peddlers the sum of \$12.00 per year as license fee.

It was decided to furnish franchise to the S. P. company as soon as switches are moved out of the street. A final reading was given to the three ordinances pertaining to the bond issue, and the special election to vote on bonds was ordered to be held July 23.

It was further decided to cooperate with the Community club in the matter of the strawberry festival which is to be held from June 13 to 15.

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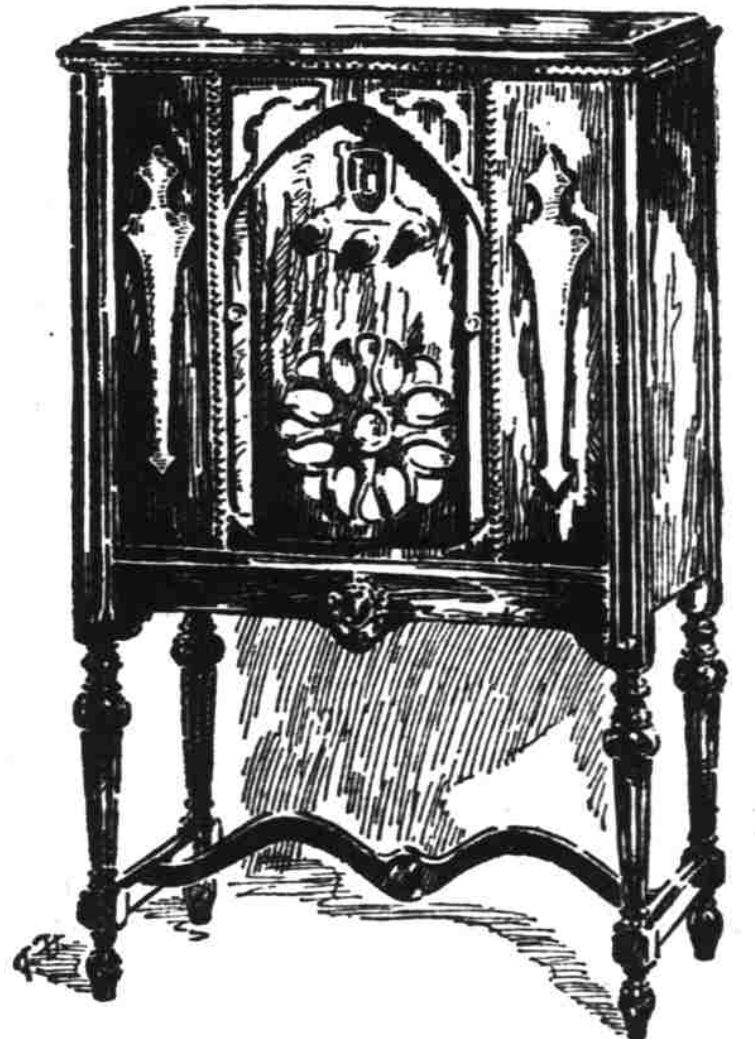
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
