WEEDS SHOULD BE CUT, LOW ADVISES

"Now is the time for all good men and true," says Walter Low, street commissioner, to cut their weeds and tall grass.

Grass and weeds in vacant lots and uncultivated spots are beginning to go to seed, and it's time to eradicate them if more trouble from the same source is to be avoided, the street commissioner warns.

Persons who want to prove their good citizenship by having the offending growth amputated but are unable to do it themselves, are asked to telephone to the street commissioner and he will provide someone to do the work.

Mr. Low is planning to enforce the ordinance relating to weeds strictly this year as affects resident owners, but he admits that he is still all at sea as to what procedure can be followed in the case of non-resident owners. He has recommended the organization of community clubs to cope with this situation in each section of the city.

Last year the appearance of the city was seriously marred by patches of luxuriant weeds and tall grass on vacant property. With many conventions bringing visitors to Salem this year, a recurrence of this condition will make a distinctly poor impression, the street commissioner emphasizes.
