There is a movement on for the advertising of Oregon prunes. Walter T. State Receives Federal Money For Counties

The secretary of state Thursday received from the federal department of the interior a check for \$1,230.74 which represents five per cent of the money received from public land sales since the last apportionment in 1925.

The amount of money to be received by the counties ranges from \$9 for some of the less important counties to \$127 by Malheur and Harney counties. The money is made available for road construction under a 1923 act.
