WORLD RECORD IS SHATTERED

Pete Rasmus Sets New Mark in Preliminary to National Meet

CHICAGO, June 7.—(AP)—A world's record was shattered, the record for the 100 yard dash was tied twice and a record for the meet was smashed as 323 athletes from 72 universities and colleges in 23 states, finished their assault in the preliminaries of the national collegiate track and field championships on Stagg field today.

Pete Rasmus of Ohio state university set a new world's record for the discus throw when he tossed the missile 160 feet 1 7/8 inches in leading the qualifiers for the finals tomorrow. This performance beat the former record of 155 feet 3 1/4 inches made by Bud Houser of the University of Southern California in 1926.

After Rasmus made his record breaking throw, Ed Moeller of Oregon unwound himself and came near tossing the platter out of the palace. He registered a toss of 159 feet 10 inches but his mark was not allowed because he had the misfortune of fouling, swinging his foot out of the circle when he sent the disk hurtling into space. He qualified, however and will have another chance to beat Rasmus mark in the finals tomorrow.

WILLING PLAYS MOE IN FINALS

Old Rivals to Clash Again Today on Alderwood Course for Title

PORTLAND, Ore., June 7.—(AP)—Rivals of a year ago for the Pacific Northwest Amateur Golf championship will meet on the Alderwood Country club course tomorrow and drive, putt and pitch for the Oregon state golf title.

The match resulted from the semi-finals in the sixth annual state competition when Dr. O. F. Willing, Waverly standard bearer, and Don Moe, Alderwood and defending champion, fought their way into the finals by two masterful exhibitions of stroke making today.

The Waverly star did not have to extend himself to defeat his younger and less experienced adversary, Malcolm MacNaughton, the long hitting youth from Oswego, who was put out of the championship running 8 and 7 in one of the semi-final rounds.

But Don Moe did not have such an easy time with Frank Duiph, his semi-final opponent, who stubbornly contested Moe's march to the final round every inch of the way with every conceivable shot known in golfdom. The match ended on the 34th hole with Moe victor by a 3 and 2 margin.

BAMBINO NOT SERIOUSLY ILL

Age of Yankee Lineup Kept Off Diamond For Week or Ten Days

NEW YORK, June 7.—(AP)—From a mass of conflicting reports as to the condition of Babe Ruth emerged tonight a statement to the Yankee club from Dr. Edward A. King that the home run hitter of the world champions has "muscular heart trouble," but is not seriously ill.

The mighty man of baseball has been out of the lineup of the Yankees since last Saturday with a congested lung and a cold. Early today published reports that the great slugger had suffered heart attacks which would keep him out of the game a month and perhaps forever, started a flood of telephone calls to the Yankee offices. Local and long distance queries came as to the latest reports from the Babe's bedside and later in the day the questions were to check on a report that the big fellow had died.

Edward G. Barrow, secretary of the Yankees, announced that the club physician expected Ruth to return to the Yankee stadium in "about a week or ten days." Previously Mrs. Ruth had reported her husband sleeping but "very ill."

Mr. Barrow declared he felt no apprehension and was quite sure the star of the team would be completely recovered in a few more days.

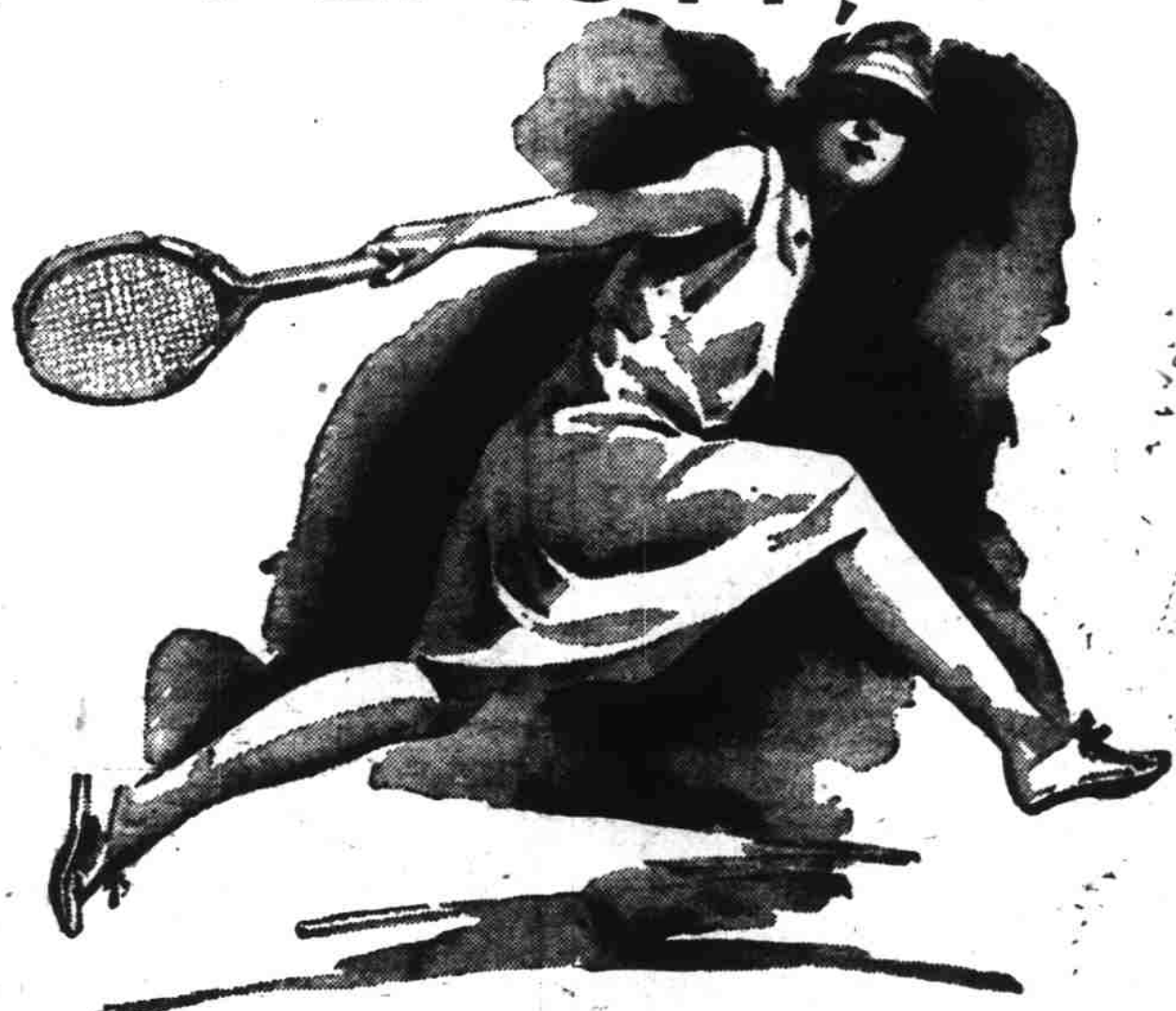
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
