CALEXICO, Calif., June 11 -(AP)-Pete Gavuzzi, bearded Italian from England, retained his lead of 55 minutes and 46 seconds in the transcontinental bunion derby today in the face of a bitter attempt by Johnny Salo Passaic, N. J. policeman, to recover first place during the 53.8 mile grind between Algodoes, Mexico, and Calexico.

Salo, virtually recovered from the stomach trouble which had made miserable his last few days of running, gave Gavuzzi a hard fight throughout the lap. They finished in a tie with Sam Richman, of New York, for second place. The trio ran the lap, seventy-third of the coast-to-coast jaunt, in 8 hours, 16 minutes and 5 seconds.

Guisto Umec, of Italy, who holds down third place in elapsed time, ran the distance in 7 hours, 30 minutes and 10 seconds to register his third lap victory in four days. By capturing it the Italian slightly closed up the gap between himself and the leaders.




