

# Local News Briefs

**Many Register for School**—Registration for the annual six-week summer grade school to be conducted at Park and Grant schools under auspices of the Oregon Normal school at Monmouth is encouraging, although whether last year's enrollment will be met is not known until the first day's attendance is checked. Only grades one to eight, inclusive, will be taught and classes will be held from 8:30 o'clock until noon each day.

**Math Failures Lower**—But eight per cent of the 1697 pupils enrolled in the mathematics courses at the senior and junior high schools the past year failed their courses, according to the annual report submitted to the city superintendent by Miss Beryl Holt, supervisor of the department. Last year 10 per cent of the enrollment failed. Seventy-two classes were taught in the three schools.

# JUDGES' PAY IS COMPUTED

**McMahan and Kelly of This District to Get \$6000 Per Year Each**

Salaries of circuit judges in Oregon, under an act of the 1929 legislature, have been computed by the secretary of state based on the federal census of 1920.

The 1929 law fixing the salaries of circuit judges provided that in judicial districts having a population of 20,000 or more they shall receive \$6000 per annum. In districts having a population of more than 15,000 and less than 20,000 the circuit judges shall receive \$5500 per annum. In districts having a population of less than 15,000 the circuit judges shall receive \$5000 per annum.

The action of the secretary of state in computing the salaries of the circuit judges on the basis of the federal census of 1920 was in conformity with an opinion of the attorney general. Officials said it was possible that some circuit judges may file a suit to have the salaries based on the actual population of the several districts on the date the law became effective. There is no official census of the districts since 1920.

Circuit judges who will receive \$5000 per annum, as computed by the secretary of state under the new law, are James T. Brand, J. W. Hamilton and G. F. Skiphworth, serving Benton, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Lane and Lincoln counties; L. H. McMahan and Percy Kelly, serving Linn and Marion counties; Jacob Kanzler, Robert G. Morrow, Robert Tucker, John H. Stevenson, Louis P. Hewitt, Walter H. Evans, George Taxwell and W. A. Ekwall, serving Multnomah county; J. U. Campbell, Clackamas county.

James Alger Fee, Umatilla county; Arlie G. Walker, Polk and Yamhill counties; George R. Bagley, Washington and Tillamook counties, and H. K. Zimmerman, Clatsop and Columbia counties.
