Recital Tea Enjoyable Affair

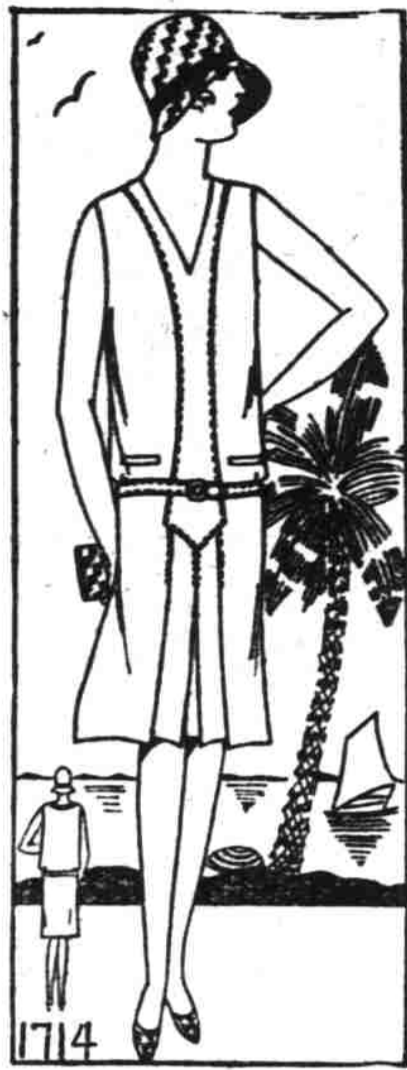

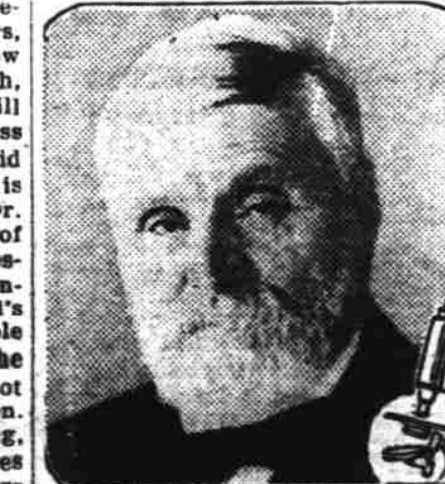
