TRIO INDICTED FOR HAGERTY'S DEATH

TANGIER, Morocco, June 13.—Ralph A. Wood, Wyandotte real estate dealer, Cecil W. Holt, and Na—of Buenos Aires, said yesterday, 2,000 Moroccan tribesmen brose L. Hagerty, Jan. 9, in a police ambush arranged to catch the alleged plotters against Wood's life.

The indictments were returned by Circuit Judge Harry J. Dingeman after a one man grand jury investigation into the shooting occupying more than four months.

Holt and Sullivan were arrested immediately after the indictments were filed. Wood, who was in Lansing at the time had not appeared tonight, although his attorney promised to produce him. Arraigned before Justice of the Peace Arthur E. Gordon this afternoon, Holt and Sullivan stood mute and pleas of not guilty entered for them.

The slaying of Hagerty was the outgrowth of an alleged plot against Wood's life in which his wife, Mrs. Grace M. Wood, William Thompson, Hagerty and Taylor were involved. The three living are now awaiting trial in circuit court on charges of assault with intent to kill.

It was Cecil Holt, associate of the alleged plotters and acquaintance of Wood, who revealed the alleged plot. An ambush of 14 policemen and other officers was arranged for the night the attack on Wood was to be made. During a gun fight in front of Wood's office, Hagerty was slain. The grand jury investigation ensued.

CUSTOMS OFFICIALS DETECT SMUGGLERS

NEW YORK, June 13.—(AP)—The customs department's tip-off system resulted Wednesday in the seizure of undeclared articles from a society woman and an opera star, bringing the total of ocean travelers caught in the customs net in the past four days to nine.

Informed that Mrs. Charles Carey Rumsey, whose late husband was a widely known sculptor and polo player and who is the daughter of the late Mrs. E. H. Harriman, was bringing in undeclared jewels, agents who met the liner France searched her baggage and subjected her to a long interrogation.

They held her 11 pieces of baggage for further examination and seized a pin, a pendant, a wrist watch and a bracelet, all jeweled, despite Mrs. Rumsey's assertion that she had had the bracelet and watch for ten years and that the pin and the pendant were merely new settings for gems given her by her mother.

A jeweled purse Mrs. Rumsey said she gave to Lucretia Boir of the Metropolitan Opera company, who had been traveling with her, was taken from the soprano. Duty, the fines aggregating \$27,036.58, were paid today by attorneys for four Chicago women who brought in 32 trunks of European apparel on the Leviathan four days ago. The women are Mrs. Anne H. Loer, Mrs. Rose Leach, Virginia Bohlen and Anna M. Katholin, all of whom had made the trip abroad together.

Last Monday, Rudolph Lederer, Chicago broker, his wife and 20 year old daughter, Ruth, failed to declare merchandise concealed in the lining of coats they wore and others packed in their trunks. The goods were seized subject to the payment of duty and fine of \$5,286, which was paid the next day.
