In investigating the hammer slaying of pretty Miss Theora Hix, Ohio state co-ed.

Dr. Snook and Marion T. Myers, graduate student at the university doing co-research, were questioned in the death this afternoon.

Man's Cap and Woman's Articles Are Discovered
The articles, which were found in Dr. Snook's automobile, consisted of a man's cap, a pair of woman's gloves, both stained, a round-headed hammer, a woman's umbrella, several hair pins, and several strands of light brown hair like that of Miss Hix. In his home detectives found a stained shirt, a jack knife with a smudge on the point and two suits of men's clothing, which had been freshly cleaned and pressed.

During the search of the Snook home, detectives found a fire in the furnace and prepared for an examination of the ashes.

Miss Hix's battered body was found on a rifle range near here yesterday. Dr. Snook, former holder of the world's record for pistol shooting, was taken into custody at the rifle range.

Myers was arrested at a fraternity house after he had called at the undertaking establishment where the girl's body lay, and had talked to Coroner James Murphy. The girl's friends had told police she recently had been in company with a man of Myers' general description.

Penney Stores Now Contain 1213 Units in Operation; More to be Opened Shortly

The total number of J. C. Penney Co. stores now in operation throughout the country is 1105 with the 168 stores represented in the purchase of the J. E. Penney Co. name will be placed over the last two chains on August 1. Despite the fact that these stores are already handling a large volume of J. C. TOURISTS GAIN AT CAMP HERE

Peak of Traffic Steadily Approaching, Reports at Park Indicate

The level of the tourist traffic through Salem is on its way to the peak, but still some distance away. If the figures of the city auto camp are taken as guides. During the month of May there were 280 registrations, and for the first 14 days of June there were 190. The total for this month will be close to the 500 mark if "tourist weather" prevails.

All of the ten cabins have been full nearly every night since the first of May and have been full every night this month. The new Brown cabins, with their complete equipment have proven very popular. These cabins, besides being well-built and roomy, are equipped with stoves, electric plates and toilets; some have one bed, and some have two beds.

All the cabins and tent houses are equipped with electric lights this year, and a string of lights has been installed on the entrance to the camp. During the winter and spring the cabins and tents were all thoroughly cleaned and repainted, and all now present a very attractive appearance.

There has been very little camping in the park thus far this spring, but with the coming of warmer weather the number of campers is expected to increase materially. The close of school will also free many families, and will mean a considerably augmented tourist group.

RURAL POWER LINE FINISHED THIS WEEK

Completion of one rural power line this week and the finishing of a second line by July 1 is making possible the use of electricity by 16 families in the country, according to W. R. Newmyer, in charge of rural extension for the Portland Electric Power company.

The circuit completed and just into use is an extension of the Clear Lake line beginning at the Clear Lake school on the river road and extending 3.2 miles north toward the Wheatland ferry.
