Turk Arrested and Then Given Immunity

In the preamble of the resolution, Senator Caraway called attention to published accounts of the recent arrest in Virginia of Kemal Djanany Bey, second secretary of the Turkish legation, and of his release upon a claim of diplomatic immunity.

Another legislative proposal was laid before the house under which the dependents of prohibition enforcement authorities killed while discharging their duty would receive \$25,000. The bill, introduced by Representative Baque, democrat, South Carolina, would extend to the widows and children of slain officers the same benefits that have been proposed for the dependents of those who might be killed by officers.

With it was introduced a bill by Representative Pittenger, republican, Minnesota, which would authorize payment of \$30,000, to the widow and two children of Henry Vikkila, killed several days ago by a customs border patrolman near International Falls, Minnesota.

Agitation Rife Over Trial Of White

Step by step he traced the world armament problem, and the need for a new method of solution, one which would take into account political and economic needs and at the same time consider the all-important law of human nature. He outlined in detail the role he believed naval technicians should play in the making of new disarmament formulas.

BILL TO TAKE N. P. LAND GRANT PASSES

WASHINGTON, June 18—(AP)—A senate bill which would declare as forfeited to the federal government certain vested rights of the Northern Pacific railway to land grants was passed today by the house and sent to the president.

The measure also would provide for the prosecution of proceedings looking to adjustment of land grants. According to Senator Kendrick, democrat, Wyoming, sponsor of the bill and member of the joint committee to investigate the Northern Pacific land grants, there are 2,672,268 acres of land in dispute between the federal government and the railroad.

The measure, which resulted from investigations by joint committee, directs the secretary of the interior to withhold approval of adjustment of grants and the issuance of any further patents and titles until the government suits contemplated in the bill finally are determined. The bill, however, in its provisions, specially declared that its terms would "not prevent the adjudication of any claims arising under public land laws where claimants are not seeking title through grants to the Northern Pacific railroad company or its successors."

PEAR PRICES FIXED BY CALIFORNIA BODY

SAN FRANCISCO, June 18—(AP)—Prices for the 1929 pear crop as set by the California Pear Growers association, meeting here today, range between \$75 and \$85 per ton, according to the locality. For No. 1 pears and 60 per cent of those amounts for pears of the No. 2 grade, last year's crop brought an average of \$46 per ton for No. 1 pears.

TARIFF REVISION IS ARGUED AT CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, June 18—(AP)—A multiplicity of developments in the tariff situation occurred on Capitol hill today but only one faint echo of the controversy over the extent of revision was heard in the senate.

Many amendments to the house bill were proposed; four senate finance subcommittees heard numerous pleas for changes in that measure; the tariff commission issued a tabulation showing agricultural and sugar products would benefit most by the bill; Representative Tilson, the republican leader, defended it and Senator Brookhart, republican, Iowa, served notice that he would propose a new debenture plan as a rider to the measure.

Brookhart declared with reference to the defeat yesterday of the Borah resolution to restrict the revision to agriculture and related products that those who voted against it upset the president's program for "limited" re-adjustment. He saw little help for the farmer in the house bill and said he would press his debenture rider as the only solution of the surplus crop problem.

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Hawley Declares Foreign Criticism of U. S. Tariff Is Not Based Upon Facts

WASHINGTON, June 18—(AP)—Chairman Hawley of the house ways and means committee said today that foreign criticism of the administrative features of the new tariff bill was not justified and that the changes in the administrative sections were "brought upon themselves by foreigners."

Appearing before the southern states agriculture commissioners' tariff conference, Hawley declared that new methods of evaluating products was resorted to after "juggling of invoices" and direct refusals to allow American investigation of production costs made it impossible to gain a fair understanding in production in this country and abroad.

This bill he added would not interfere with foreign trade. Opposing an ad valorem rate of 35 per cent on shingles, as proposed in the bill, J. A. Edgcombe, St. Paul, Minn., representing the stained shingle industry, told the sub-committee on the wood schedule that Canadian shingles were not being sold in "direct competition" with those produced in Oregon and Washington.

"Prices of shingles will not

stand any further increase," he declared, "and if it is raised wood shingles will be displaced by composition ones."

Representative Knutsen, Minnesota, opposed the increases on building materials, asserting increased rates would "impose an unnecessary burden on the consumer."

"It costs more to produce lumber in Canada than it does here," he said, adding that the wood schedule was the outstanding issue in the fifth Minnesota congressional district yesterday in which, on the face of early returns, Lieutenant Governor W. I. Nolan, republican, had only a small lead. At the last election, Knutsen said, the republican candidate, was elected by a large plurality.

Representative Strong, Kansas, urged a senate sub-committee to retain the house tariff bill, provision designed to give American wheat millers a Cuban flour market in competition with flour milled in bond and exported to Cuba, a duty of 20 per cent which is equivalent to reduction in the Cuban tariff allowed American flour under a trade reciprocity agreement with the United States.
