

PRATUM SCHOOL VOTE WARM ONE

William DeVries Reelected Director; Vote Brings Out Big Number

PRATUM, June 18.—More interest was displayed than probably ever before in the annual school meeting held at the school Monday evening. Notices had been posted that the meeting would be for the purpose of electing one director, a clerk and the board asked to be authorized to dispose of the old school house as soon as the bids for the new building are let. There were three nominations for director, William de Vries, Everett Branch and Fred de Vries, the latter receiving the nomination, as he has to spare in the Sunday school work of the county. Seventy-two votes were cast, William de Vries, the outgoing director receiving 45 votes and Everett Branch, 26 votes.

There were four nominations for clerk, Claud Ramsden, A. L. Bowen, Miss Mary Schapp and Oscar Meyer. All but Claud Ramsden declined the nomination, although when the ballot was cast at least half a dozen others received a few votes, but Mr. Ramsden was elected by an overwhelming majority.

The board was authorized to sell the old school house as soon as the bid on the new building was let. The old building will probably be sold at public auction, as most of the property holders of the district prefer to have it sold that way.

A meeting of the Oregon judicial council will be held in Salem July 3, according to announcement made here Tuesday by Chief Justice Coshaw of the state supreme court.

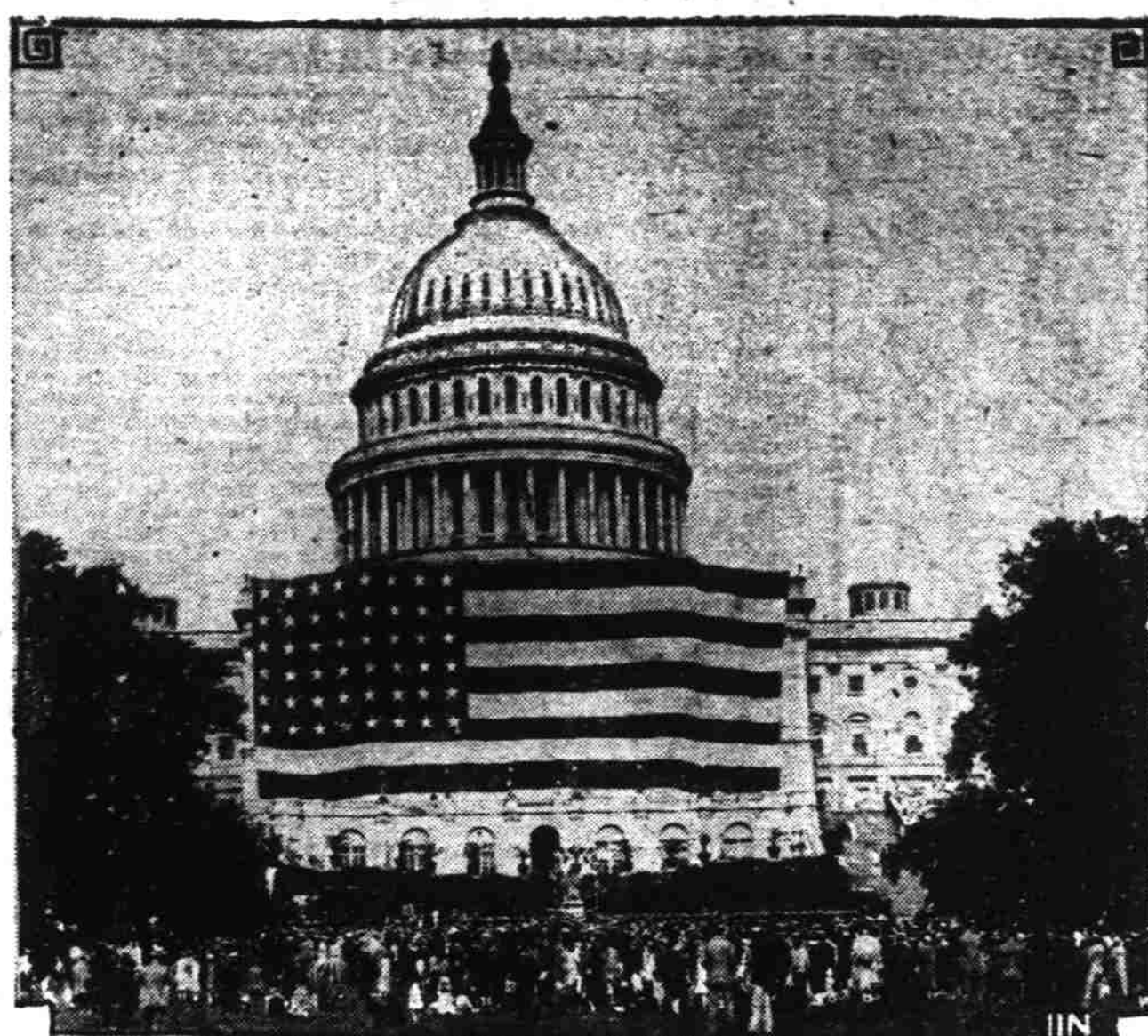
Three of the important questions to be considered at the meeting are:

BIBLE SCHOOL IS ENDED BY PICNIC

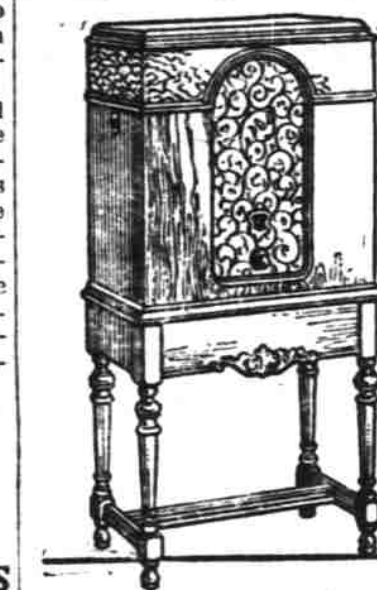
