

Benny Pelz and Ted Fox Headliners for Next Fight Card

SALEM LEAD IS TRAINING HARD

Harry Plant, Matchmaker, Arranges Go At Armory Shortly

CAMP CLATSOP, Ore., June 19. (Special)—Benny Pelz, the "fighting musician" of Portland, and Teddy Fox of Salem will be the headliners on the next fight card to be staged at the Salem armory. Matchmaker Harry Plant announced as soon as the National Guard company returns to Salem.

Pelz won a decision in their first encounter several months ago, and has been fighting frequently since that time, so he is sure to be in excellent condition. Fox, however, is in better condition than he was for that first fight; he learned his lesson then and has come around to hard training for all of his fights. He will be better able to stand the gaff and hand out punishment.

One six round bout and three of four rounds each will also be on the card. Local youngsters and scrappers from valley towns who have developed large followings in their respective localities, will furnish the opening thrills.

Announcement that Teddy Fox and Benny Pelz have been rematched, is certain to meet with hearty favor among local fans who clamored for such an event after these two scrappers staged their fast battle here last winter. It was impossible to gratify their wishes at the time, as Fox suffered an extended siege of "flu" shortly after that fight.

It was a hard fight, with Fox revealing superior speed, and there were many fans who thought he should have had at least a draw.

Pelz, however, found Teddy's bread basket with stinging uppercuts frequently throughout the fight, and administered the greater amount of punishment. Fox is confident that he can develop a defense for that triphammer blow which caused him so much trouble, and believes that his speed and aggressiveness will carry him through to a victory.

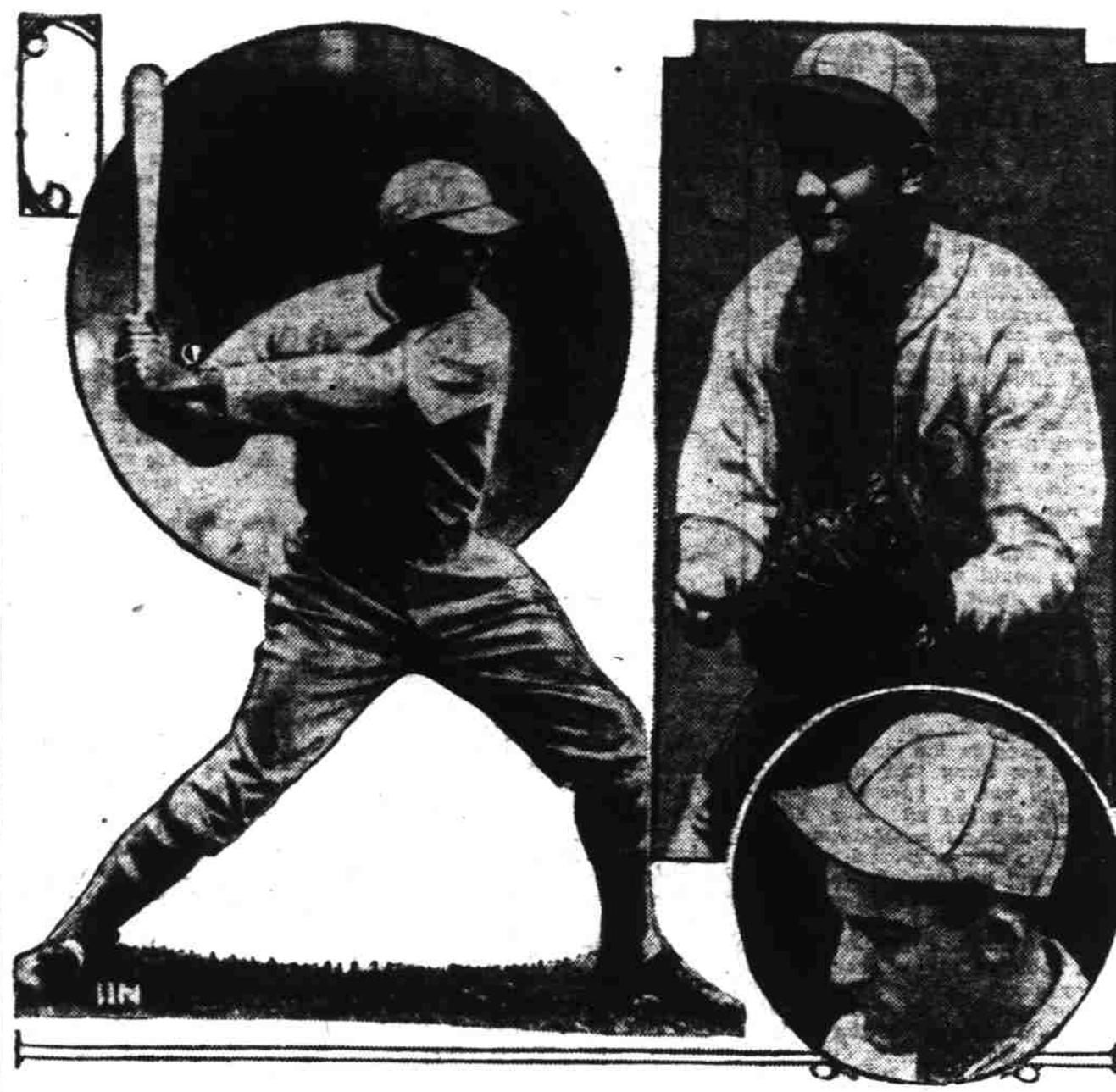

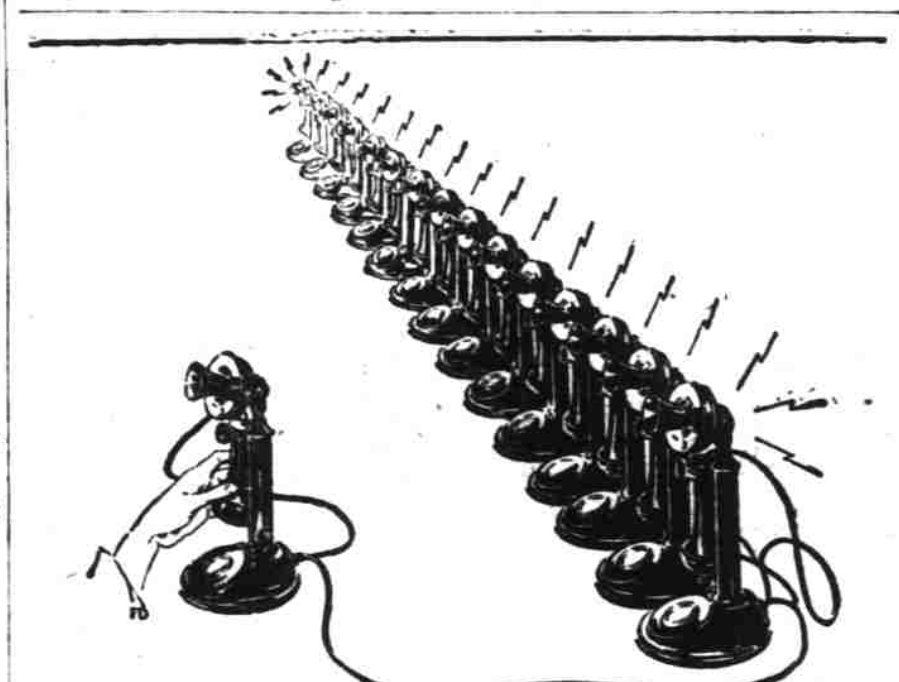
