MONOPLANE DIVES INTO ST. LAWRENCE

MONTREAL, June 20.—(AP)—A cabin monoplane crashed in the St. Lawrence river off Point St. Charles and Verdun late today and its occupants were believed drowned. The plane overturned in the water and efforts were being made to extricate the victims, the number of whom was undetermined.

Canoeists saw the plane which was equipped with pontoons, flying down the river for several miles. Suddenly it descended to the surface and overturned. Onlookers said they thought it had struck a wire which was stretched across the river.

Boats at once put out to the rescue, but it was necessary to await the arrival of special equipment to get at the cabin. The plane was believed to be one owned privately in Montreal.
