County Assessor IS LODGED IN JAIL

Mahan attempted to get in touch with Governor Patterson, but the governor was out of the city.

14 KILLED BY CARS IN SINGLE MONTH

Fourteen persons were killed and 22 injured in 291 traffic accidents in Oregon during May, according to a report prepared by T. A. Rafferty, in charge of the state traffic department. Approximately 1107 accidents were due to carelessness on the part of the drivers. In 221 cases the drivers failed to give proper signals. More than 380 accidents were caused by drivers attempting to take the right of way. The officers participated in 1112 arrests, with fines imposed in the amount of \$2588.90. Warnings were issued in 681 cases. The officers collected delinquent fees of \$8918 and recovered stolen cars with a resale value of \$5200.
