Baptist Minister Changes Vote to Make Matter Unanimous

JACKSON, Miss., June 25 (AP)-Unreserved disapproval of the entertainment at the White House of the wife of Oscar De Priest, negro representative from Illinois, was expressed today by the Mississippi state senate in a resolution adopted unanimously.

The resolution, calling on President Hoover to give "careful and thoughtful consideration to the necessity of the preservation of the racial integrity of the white race," was then sent to the house of represntaivs.

Ban on Grapefruit Sought of Grocers In Medford District

MEDFORD, Ore., June 25. — (AP) — Precautionary measures against any possible invasion of the Rogue river valley by the Mediter-ranean fruit fly has been taken by the fruit growers league, with a request to local grocery stores that they discontinue the sale of Florida grapefruit. Albert Burch, president of the fruit growers league said there is "rather extensive handling of Florida grape-fruit by Medford grocers," and said it was "needless jeopardizing of a five million dollar fruit crop.

"Although there is no Mediterranean fruit fly closer to this section than Fiorida, there is always a chance of infestation through Florida products," Burch declared.

"With the discovery of just one fly the bottom would drop out of the pear market," Burch told the




