

American Women Monopolize Limelight at Wimbledon

BUNDY DEFEATS ENGLISH CHAMP

Three U. S. Players Reach Women's Quarter Finals Tilden Winner

WIMBLEDON, England, June 28.—(AP)—America's women tennis invaders stepped into the breach today and saved the United States from an almost utter rout in the English championships on the Wimbledon courts.

In the elimination of John Hennessey and Wilmer Allison, United States Davis cup players, by Henri Cochet and Jean Borotra, Uncle Sam's forces were expected a taste of what might be expected if they took up with France in the final Davis cup round. With the win of Pandy the French are assured of three in the eight players in the quarter final round.

But the two Helens from California—Wills and Jacob—did the same thing for America in the women's section. All three qualified for the quarter final round. The California girls won with comparative ease, with Mrs. Bundy turning in the sensational upset victory of the day in the downing of Miss Eileen Bennett, English Wightman cup player.

Big Bill Beats

Rising above the setbacks handed America's men racketeers in the women's matches, in which special honors went to Mrs. Bundy. With her 12 year old daughter looking on with approving eyes the 42 year old mother defeated beautiful Miss Bennett 3-6, 6-4, 6-4. Champion of 25 Years Ago Wins

After losing the first set and trailing 4-2 in the second and 4-1 in the third the Wimbledon champion of 25 years ago fought her way to a victory that amazed not only the large crowd but the English girl as well.

Countering Miss Bennett's steady base line game with all the court strategy and stroke perfection of her many years of play, the California veteran proved that girls, who used to play in long skirts, tight fitting shirt waists and straw hats can beat the modern maid, who, dressed something like chorus girls, disturbs the proprieties of staid old Wimbledon.

But Mrs. Bundy has modernized her tennis costume as she has her game. It was strokes and fighting spirit rather than clothes that gave her today's victory. Miss Wills with accustomed ease, beat Miss Sigart of Belgium, 6-2, 6-3, as Miss Jacobs also won her way into the last eight by eliminating the English girl star, Joan Fry, 6-3, 6-4.

Spanish Favorite Loses to Unknown

The other sensation of the women's play was the defeat of Senorita de Alvarez of Spain, picked to meet Miss Wills in the championship match, by Mrs. C. O. McQuham, a comparatively unknown to tennis circles. Mrs. McQuham won 6-4, 4-6, 6-2.

Under a blazing sun, which provided the best of tennis weather, Tilden opened up the center court play against Bessie. Bessie carried the second set to 7-7 before Big Bill unbowed a few cannonball services to win.

Yankees Doubles Tennis Do Better

Hennessey was far from his top form during his first two sets which went to Cochet 6-1, 6-4. The young American rallied and forced the third to 9-7, before Cochet won. The Allison-Borotra match provided the most exciting finish of the week. The Texan finally was beaten 6-3, 6-1, 4-6, 6-3.

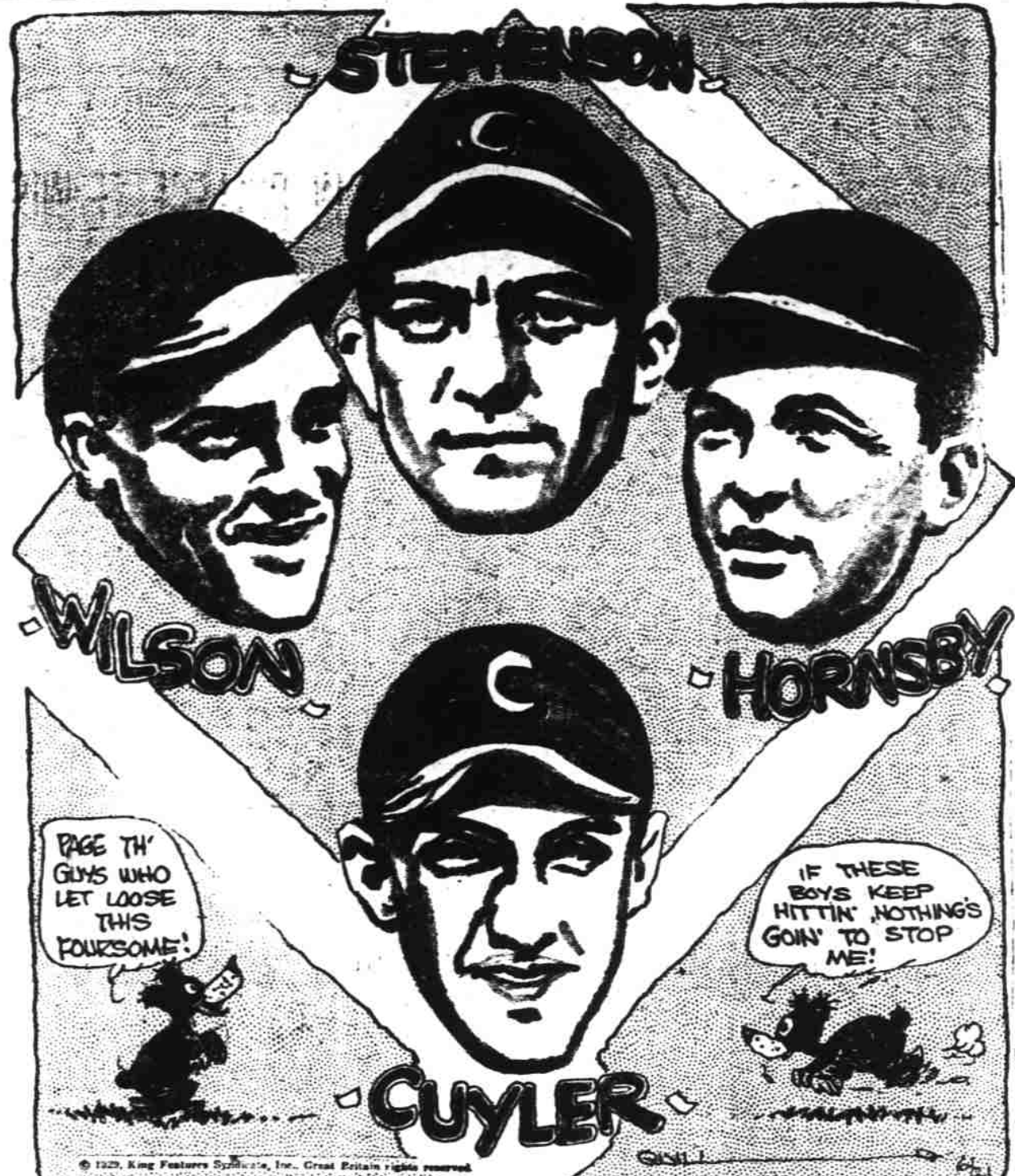
But while the Americans were falling by the wayside in the singles, the doubles combinations were going much better. Tilden and Hunter defeated O. G. V. Turnbull and J. B. Gilbert of England 6-3, 6-2, 6-4; Hennessey and Lott disposed of the German pair, Kohlman and Neudecker, 7-5, 7-9, 6-2, and Lott and Miss Edith Gross eliminated the English-New Zealand combination of Miss Urner and F. M. B. Fisher 6-4, 6-8, 6-4.

Cloudburst Strews Golf Championship Hopes All Over Winged Foot Course

WINGED FOOT CLUB, Mamaroneck, N. Y., June 28.—(AP)—A terrific storm that at times bore every resemblance to a cloudburst struck the national open golf championship today, scattered the hopes all over the place and helped remove the famous Atlanta amateur, Bobby Jones, from the leadership, as the field wound up the first half of the spectacular 72 hole championship battle.

Early in the morning, before the stormy gale gathered full headway and broke over the bunkered battleground, stocky Gene Sarazen, of New York, champion in 1922, and equally sturdy Al Espinosa, Spanish star from Chicago, shot out in front, deadlocked with totals of 152 each for 36 holes that withstood attacks throughout the day and through the disastrous downpour.

Down at Oakland, Hottenger had about 40 fights, with plenty of success, and he's hoping for a chance to show his wares here.

"We don't care so much what money there is in the first fight," his manager said. "If the fans see this boy once they'll demand another look."
