SYKES-HJERTAAS RECITAL PLEASES

One of the most pleasing recitals of recent months was that presented by Lauren B. Sykes at the organ and Ella Hjertaas, vocalist, Friday night in the residence studio of Prof. and Mrs. T. S. Roberts. An audience of 125 invited guests gave enthusiastic appreciation for the artistic program offered.

Ella Hjertaas, assistant director of music in St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota, and member of the famed choir of St. Olaf's which has appeared several times in the west, won her audience both through the quality of her voice and the vividness of her personality.

Her voice, a full, broad, deep voice with silvery casts and beautifully modulated to fit the acoustics of the studio was especially effective in "An die Musik," Schubert; and with the support of Prof. Roberts at the organ, and Prof. Sykes at the piano Ella Hjertaas won a brilliant ovation with "When I first met Thee," Rubinstein.

Lauren B. Sykes, director of music at the Hinson Memorial Baptist church, Portland, sat at the organ, graceful, unaffected, easy, and played in such manner as to make the organ a living sound of soft, yet characteristic music. His numbers were different, and were sympathetically and individually interpreted. "At the Foot of Fujiyama," a modern and fantastical Oriental composition, and "Grand Offertoire de Ste. Cecile No. 2," E. Batiste were masterful in both the expressed and suggested feelings.

The work of artists, this recital left a happy memory with no unpleasant jars.

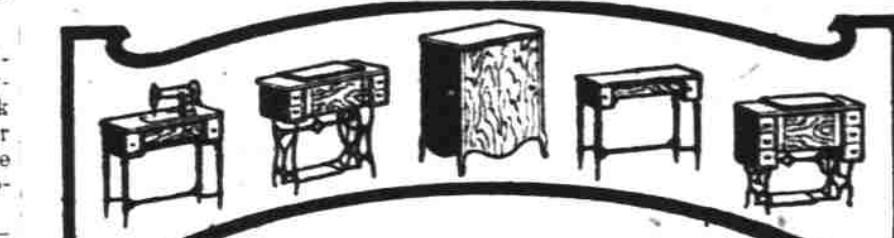
