DR. COPELAND URGES **PREVENTIVE MEASURE**

Science Has Conquered the Once Dreaded Diphtheria, Says Famous Authority, Beseeching Parents to Immunize Their Children.

UST a week or so ago I told you about diphtheria. But I am so pleased that the able Commissioner of Health of New York City is continuing his campaign against diphtheria I want to tell you more about it. Dr. Wyane is insisting that all children be inoculated

against this terrible disease.

tremely prevalent and very, very fatal. Little children who had passed through the dangers of infancy and had not yet gained the strength and sturdiness of school age were the ones who

Not only was it a fatal disease in those days, out the deaths were dreadful to witness. The

poor children actually choked to death. I can well recall the leathery, grayish mem-brane as it filled the throat and as it grew, ulti-

mately shut off the breathing. As the poisons of the disease were absorbed the health and fig-ure of the child melted away, giving every evi-dence of the virulence of the disease. It makes me shiver to think of what happened to childhood from the effects of this one ailment. Unfortunately for mankind, we have plenty of diseases today that cannot be controlled. We face those for which there is no known cause. There are others so obscure that we have been unable to find effective remedies.

effective remedies. Diphtheria is not in this catalogue. It has been lifted from the unknown to one of the best understood of human aliments. There is no excuse today for any considerable number of deaths from this disease. Sometimes lay persons sneer a lit-tie at the scientists. But no one can sneer at what they have done to guard young children against disas-ter. If there were no other reason for applauding their efforts, the dis-covery of a means of protection

covery of a means of protection against diphtheris would be duite sufficient. If their methods are fol-lowed universally, diphtheris will disappear as a cause of death.

disappear as a cause of death. Any community can free itself of this danger. Every physician has in his possession a sure means of pre-venting diphtheria. Everybody dreads an operation. I don't suppose anybody ever faced a surgical knife without secret fear and perhaps visible trembling. Even so simple a thing as having a tooth everyed is a matter of concern. But so simple a thing as having a tooth extracted is a matter of concern. But as compared with these the mocula-tion against diphtheria is as nothing. It is neither painful nor dangerous. I bes that every parent who has confidence in my advice may con-suit the family physician regarding this procedure. Tour little ones are too dear to you to take any chance of a disease so dreadful as diph-theria. The trilling inconvenience
