

Maxie Rosenbloom Is Awarded Decision Over Anderson

KENTUCKY LAD IS OUTPOINTED

Jewish Scrapper From New York Piles Up Lead in Portland Fight

PORTLAND, Ore., July 4.—(AP)—Maxie Rosenbloom, New York Jewish light heavyweight boxer, outpointed Joe Anderson of Covington, Kentucky in a ten round bout in the Pacific coast league baseball park here this afternoon. The New Yorker used a snappy straight left with an occasional right cross to pile up his lead. He held the advantage in practically every round. In the sixth and seventh rounds Anderson flashed a short rally but Rosenbloom, with some clever footwork and boxing, kept out of reach of his opponent and the latter soon slowed down.

In another ten round bout on the card Willie Feldman, New York middleweight, took the decision over Edna of Oakland, Cal. Feldman closed Uhlan's right eye early in the fight and before the bell ended the tenth had him badly battered around the face. Ritchie King, Los Angeles and Mat Calo, San Francisco, fought six rounds to a draw. They are lightweights. The six round bout between Tony Taloreo, Walla Walla, and Jack McGreer, Portland, light heavyweights, also was a draw. Al Trumans, St. Helens, took a four round decision over Billy Church, Portland in the welterweight class and Roy Cress, Portland, outpointed Billy Robbins, Portland, bantamweight, in the first four rounds.

POSTOFFICE ASKS CARE IN ADDRESSES

With vacation season here again and people leaving their homes, offices and workshops to seek rest and recreation, at mountain, seaside and other summer resorts, the postoffice is issuing warnings that persons be sure their mail is properly addressed in order that it may reach them with certainty and promptness.

Much unnecessary annoyance, inconvenience and disappointment results from failure of vacationists to advise the post office of their change of address, as to their correct temporary summer address. Postmaster John Far points out.

In some cases vacationists give the postoffice the name of a summer camp or railroad station which is not a postoffice, a mistake which postal patrons could avoid if they would be sure to ascertain before they leave whether or not there is a postoffice at or near the vacation spot.

CHURCH OF ENGLAND SENDS MAN TO JAIL

CAMBRIDGE, England, July 4.—(AP)—The British public has just found a new and unusual sensation in what the press characterizes as an amazing case involving the right of the Church of England in some instances to send people to prison without recourse to the ordinary civil courts.

John Stevens, a wealthy Cambridge landowner, is now in Bedford jail, where he was sent by the ecclesiastical court at Ely, while a force of lawyers is trying to get him out. Stevens refused to repair the church of St. Edmund standing on property he recently bought. Under the terms of the old deed he was said to be bound to repair the church, but he maintained that this clause had lapsed through disuse.

The ecclesiastical court thereupon imprisoned Stevens under a law passed during the reign of William IV., giving the church such power in civil cases relating to a church or church property. His relatives repaired the church immediately but Stevens cannot get out of prison until the church court meets and considers a petition for his release, which will be at the end of the week.

The press expresses great surprise regarding the case because few people know that the church has such power today.

Electricity Turned Off Half Hour

Light and power service in north Salem was off about half an hour Thursday morning, when workmen let a large timber fall across a guy wire attached to a pole supporting the 11,000 volt circuit which supplies that northern part of the city. Weight of the timber pulled the pole over and broke the 11,000 volt wires.

Although Thursday being a holiday occasioned some delay in making the necessary repairs, power was on again in about 30 minutes, due to the fact that the new loop circuit on 17th street makes it possible to supply substitution in North Salem from either direction. The new circuit was recently installed at a cost of about \$2,500. One line leaves the power house and goes out Mill street, and the other goes down past the water company's pumping station, then north through the alley. Both lines come together out at the Fairgrounds.

These two lines are normally operated as two separate circuits, and if a wire breaks down on one of them the switch which connects the two lines together is closed, thus permitting service to be supplied to the undamaged portion of the line in which the break occurred, while repairs are being made to the damaged portion.

DRINKING SOON TO BE PASSE, CLAIM

KANSAS CITY, July 4.—(AP)—Young people no longer consider drinking daring and unusual and bootlegging will soon be outlawed socially, Dr. Tr. Landrith, Chicago, told International Christian Endeavor leaders here.

Dr. Landrith, citizenship superintendent of the organization which is meeting in five days convention here commented on his observations at a trustees meeting.

"We are passing the phase in this country when it was thought smart to drink cocktails and when our young people giggled around in hip-flask bottles," he continued. "It's not so daring and original now to drink just because it's illegal. I look for the day soon when bootlegging will become as common as well as legally outlawed among decent persons."

Dr. Landrith said his work last year took him to 45 states, "including the three foreign countries in our midst, Wisconsin, New York and Montana."

That foreign country, Montana, soon will vote state enforcement again, I believe, and as for Wisconsin and New York, there is a fine growing prohibition sentiment in those states as never before," he continued.

YANKEE CREWS WIN ON THAMES

Columbia University Eight and Browne Nichols Prep Show Great Speed

HENLEY, England, July 4.—(AP)—Two American crews rowed to impressive victories today in the famed Henley regatta on the Thames.

The crack eight of Columbia university swept past Kingston with a well-timed last minute spurt that gave the Americans a one length final margin in the second round of the preliminaries for the Thames cup. A few minutes later the Browne Nichols prep school eight of Boston flashed over the finish line a length ahead of Peterhouse college.

The victories put both American eights in the quarter finals tomorrow. In tomorrow's race Columbia faces Trinity college of Cambridge, one of the best British crews in the competition. Browne Nichols is the favorite to repeat its successes against Sidney college if the youngsters can spurt again with the superior judgment shown today.

TUNNEY BALM SUIT BY JURY REQUESTED

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., July 3.—(AP)—A motion for a trial by jury was filed today by Col. Lewis R. Tunney of New Haven, counsel for Mrs. Katherine King, Regent of New York, in her \$500,000 breach of promise action against Joseph J. (Gene) Tunney, retired heavyweight boxing champion.

Tunney became a part of the court record in the case today although Colonel Fields has not replied to an answer and counter-complaint filed by counsel for Tunney that the suit based upon the woman's claim that he had promised to marry her was nothing more than a holdup.

Mrs. Fogarty's counsel previously had announced that a reply to these allegations from the Tunney quarter would be filed by Sept. 1. The early claim for jury trial unless met with objection by counsel for Tunney will place the case near the head of the trial list with a possibility for an early assignment.

BLAST USED TO HIDE SHORTAGE OF FUNDS

LOS ANGELES, July 4.—(AP)—The Los Angeles Grain Exchange was damaged today by dynamite which Perry E. Parson, cashier, admitted to police he had placed in hope of destroying records and covering a \$1,500 shortage in his accounts. The explosion caused damage estimated at \$2,000, but did not obliterate the exchange records.

Further damage from fire or gas explosion were prevented by office workers who extinguished a lighted candle in the lavatory, placed near open gas jets. The dynamite explosion broke open a record cabinet in the board of directors' room and scattered debris in the exchange lobby. Dynamite bombs placed in ledgers in the office of the secretary manager failed to explode, although Parson said he lighted the fuses twice. Parsons told the police he intended "making a thorough job" of the dynamiting, but that in his hurry he had not lighted the fuses of part of the bombs properly.

SLAYER SENTENCED TO DIE ON GALLOWS

LOS ANGELES, July 3.—(AP)—John L. Howard was sentenced to be hanged at San Quentin September 27 by Superior Judge Carlos S. Hardy today, after the jurist had refused a motion for a new trial by defense counsel.

Howard was convicted of the murder of Victor A. Cooley, Pasadena auto rental proprietor, last week.

Howard was charged with beating Cooley so severely with a mechanics hammer that the victim died four days later. The assault occurred last April.

In his defense Howard repudiated an asserted confession and endeavored to set up an alibi. The prosecution showed business differences and jealousy of Howard against Cooley, over Mrs. Cooley's affection, promoted the fatal assault. The condemned man heard the death sentence without apparent emotion.

JONES WILL INVADE BRITISH ISLES AGAIN

ATLANTA, Ga., July 4.—(AP)—Bobby Jones is planning another British invasion next year. The American open and amateur champion said today he would enter both the British open and amateur tournaments in 1930 if he was successful in defending his United States amateur championship at Del Monte, Cal., next September.

If he wins the amateur again, the peerless Georgian will go abroad again next summer with a chance to do something no golfer has ever done before—win both of the big British tournaments while holding at the same time both the American open and amateur crowns.

Bob had twice won the British open—in 1926 and 1927—but he has failed in both his shots at the British amateur, the only major golf title he has not held at one time or another in the last eight years.

Back in his law offices today with the din of Atlanta's welcome still ringing in his ears, Bobby took time out to explain how he suddenly snapped back into form at Winged Foot after the ragged golf he played in his preliminary rounds at Eastlake.

"I had a chance to get in some good golf at Winged Foot the week before the tournament and my game came back to me," said the champion. "Golf is a curious game, anyway. You never know today what you are going to do tomorrow. I wasn't satisfied until the Tuesday before the tournament began. Then I had a good round while playing with Gene Sarazen against Leo Diegel and Bill Mehlhorn. I felt that I was on edge, so I cancelled a match I had made for Wednesday and shot no more golf until the first round of the tournament started Thursday."

SPANISH AVIATORS ON WAY TO MADRID

ALGERIRAS, Spain, July 4.—(AP)—A special train tonight sped Major Ramon Franco and his three companions, rescued near the Azores from their attempted trans-Atlantic flight last week, homeward to Madrid.

A tremendous demonstration of enthusiasm and affection, from the head of the government down to the great body of Madrid citizens, awaited them there tomorrow morning.

Enormous crowds gave them a send off for Madrid this afternoon to the tune of the British and Spanish national anthems, the governor of Algeiras, the captain-general of the marine department of Cadix, and the local authorities saw them depart in company with officers of the British aircraft carrier Eagle, which rescued them at sea.

Demand is still good for loganberries which are being quoted at four cents a pound with production not equaling the demand on the market.

Two American Girls Enter Finals at Wimbledon Net Tournament; Men Beaten

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 4.—(AP)—Two American girls from California—Miss Helen Wills and Miss Helen Jacobs—saved Independence day for the United States in the Wimbledon tennis championships today.

Continuing their march through the women's division of the unofficial world's championships, the two Helens defeated the remaining English players to provide the first all-American final in the history of the old Wimbledon. The two Californians meet tomorrow for the title.

Miss Wills started the Fourth of July program with one of her customary wins, defeating the fair-haired English girl, Miss Elsie Goldsack, 6-2, 6-0. A short time later on the center court Miss Jacobs made the celebration complete by disposing of Miss Joan Ridley in almost as short a time 6-2, 6-3.

The English lion, however, came back with a great roar when the British Davis cup pair—J. C. Gregory from Yorkshire and I. G. Collins, the Scotsman—defeated the American doubles champions, John Hennessey and George Lott.

Although defeated the Americans did not go down without a struggle, losing only after five sets of as spectacular tennis as has been seen at Wimbledon this year. The score was 4-6, 7-5, 6-1, 4-6, 7-5.

In the only all-American affair of the day the old doubles firm of Bill Tilden and Frances T. Hunter

were forced to take a three-set defeat from the youngster combination of Wilmer Allison and Johnny Van Ryn. The old timers managed to make matters interesting in the second set but the "kids" won 6-3, 12-10.

With the women's championship certain to come to the United States, the two French aces—Henri Cochet and Jean Borotra—will meet Saturday for the men's title, Allison and Van Ryn tangle with Gregory and Collins on the same day for the doubles championship.
