

Helen Wills Bests Yankee Rival to Win Net Championship

FINALS WON IN STRAIGHT SETS

Only 16 Games Lost in Six Matches of Tournament at Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 5.—(AP)—Conquering Miss Helen Jacobs by scores of 6-1, 6-2, in Wimbledon's first all American final in women's singles, Miss Helen Wills won her third straight British championship on the famous Center court today.

These two American girls who live in the same California city traveled more than 5,000 miles to enter the Wimbledon tournament, played their way through opposite halves of the draw without losing a set and met in a title match which was no more exciting or doubtful than if it had been played on a club court in Berkeley instead of the famous patch of tennis turf in the world with 15,000 persons looking on.

Miss Jacobs Wins Opening Game

It was Miss Wills' match all the way after the opening game which Miss Jacobs took on her strong service. The challenger never had the lead again nor did she ever appear to threaten, but against the genius of Miss Wills' racquet her strong right arm and unequalled court strategy the sturdy Miss Jacobs fought a good fight.

The bare score fails to reveal the prolonged rallies that featured the match. For an hour the shorter and stockier Helen stayed off defeat and during five of the seven games of the first set, she gave the champion a battle.

Four Games Go To Deuce Many Times

Winning the first game Miss Jacobs dropped the next two quickly, but the next four were long advantage affairs. Back and forth across the net the girls hammered the ball, Miss Wills, with the precision of artillery fire, pounding first one and then the other far corner of Miss Jacobs' court. Her courageous opponent raced after the ball and made beautiful returns, but the physical demand was too great and after a dozen perfect forehand and backhand drives she would fall into error and hit the ball down into the net, drive it beyond the baseline or pop it into the air where Miss Wills, always alert, was ready to smash it for a sure point winner.

Although defeat was inevitable, Miss Jacobs never gave up. With set point against her, she fought off the decisive stroke half a dozen times in the opening session and she also carried the final game of the match to deuce twice.

Every Set of Play Miss Wills Won

Miss Wills captured the Wimbledon title without losing a set. Incidentally, he dropped only 16 games in six matches, to that the three games Miss Jacobs was able to get made a showing a little better than the average. As in other years the great American player clearly demonstrated her world supremacy in a representative international field, for she defeated English, German, Belgian, South African and American girls to retain her title.

Miss Jacobs had almost as good a record as Miss Wills until the final. Up to that point she played six matches to Miss Wills' five and lost 22 games, no set. Although apparently improved over last year, Miss Jacobs seems no nearer the throne of the queen, in the final for the 1928 American championship she lost the same number of games, Miss Wills winning at 6-2, 6-1.

Not content with her one-sided success in singles, Miss Wills took the court later with Frank Hunter and reached the final in mixed doubles by a victory at 6-8, 6-2, 6-3, over Miss "Bobbie" Heine and N. G. Farquharson, a South African combination. In one of the championship battles scheduled for tomorrow Miss Wills and Hunter will oppose a powerful English team comprising Miss Joan Fry and J. C. Collins.

TRAIN EMPLOYEES TAKE STRIKE VOTE

CHICAGO, July 6.—(AP)—A strike vote being taken among the locomotive engineers of three western railway systems involves questions of representation and mileage for extra engineers, and a wage increase is not at issue, said R. E. Edgington, assistant grand chief engineer of the International Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers in a statement today.

Edgington pointed out that an Associated Press dispatch July 2, quoted him erroneously in granting the strike vote to a two year wage controversy between the locomotive engineers and the railroads of the United States and Canada.

The vote is under way among engineers of the Missouri Pacific, the terminal association of St. Louis and the Milwaukee railroad and should be completed about July 15, Edgington said. Negotiations with other railroads have not reached the point where a reference to the brotherhood membership is necessary.

New Spanish Constitution Drawn Up For Study Until Action is Taken Next Fall

MADRID, July 5.—(AP)—A new constitution of the Spanish monarchy was presented in the national assembly today for study and examination by the assemblymen during the summer.

The project contains 11 sections and 104 articles detailing various concepts of the nation, state, nationality, individual rights, the monarchy and the succession to the throne.

PARIS, July 5.—(AP)—The new constitution of Spain was presented in the Spanish national assembly today and will come up for plenary action in October, it became known tonight in Paris.

By this constitution Spain is made a constitutional monarchy with Roman Catholicism as the state religion. The rights of free speech and publication by all Spanish subjects are guaranteed with certain exceptions.

The executive power of the state is vested in the king, who, however, must consult the responsible ministers on important affairs. The legislative power will lie in a single body called the cortes.

One half of the cortes will be elected by universal suffrage, 30 members appointed by royal de-

YANKEE PREP CREW WINNER

Only One American Aggregation Remains in English Competition

HENLEY, England, July 5.—(AP)—The Transatlantic fleet competing for England's highest aquatic honors at the Henly regatta dwindled today to one American crew and a lone Canadian sculler.

Taking the backwash of the powerful college eight of Cambridge, Columbia university's crack 150 pound boatload failed in the quarter finals for the Thames challenge cup but Browne and Nicholas, a preparatory school eight miles from Boston, swept into the semifinals by whipping Sidney Sussex college.

Keeping pace with the New England schoolboys, Joe Wright, Jr., of Canada, won the right to defend his diamond sculls singles championship in the finals tomorrow by eliminating F. Bradley, of Pembroke college, Cambridge, in one semifinal heat.

His final challenger is L. Gunther, Dutch Olympic sculler, who pulled home today ten lengths ahead of Viscount Tiverton in 10 minutes, 47 seconds.

Browne and Nichols will meet Trinity, conqueror of Columbia, in the semifinal round tomorrow with an even chance of victory.

PHEASANTS TO BE DISTRIBUTED

Over 22,000 Chinese Birds Will be Turned Loose This Season

PORTLAND, Ore., July 5.—(AP)—Harold Child, city state game warden, announced today that the state game commission will distribute between 22,000 and 23,000 Chinese pheasants throughout Oregon this year.

He said he based his estimate upon receipt of reports from the various game farms for the season to date.

In addition there are now distributed 20,000 of these birds, he stated.

A total of 6325 pheasants have been hatched out at the Pendleton game farm; 4344 at the Corvallis farm and 7048 at the Eugene farm, making a total of 17,117.

Last year there are now in process of incubation 7932 eggs which, under ordinary circumstances, will probably produce from 4,000 to 5,000 pheasants.

The main distribution of the birds will start after July 15, Mr. Childford stated. Some have already been liberated in game refuges and other places where there is somebody to look after them.

OFFICIALS HEADING TOWARD THE DALLES

Governor Patterson, Secretary of State Hoss, and T. A. Rafferty, chief of the state traffic department, left Salem Friday by automobile for The Dalles, where they will accept the new state tuberculosis hospital, which will be opened there today.

From The Dalles the officials will go to Boise, Idaho, where they will attend a conference of western officials with relation to aeronautic regulation. The officials also will confer with government officials in connection with irrigation projects, and attend a joint meeting of state highway departments.

Members of the Oregon highway commission will leave for Boise Sunday.

8 Fatalities Due To Industries

There were eight fatalities due to industrial accidents during the week ending July 3, according to a report prepared by the state industrial accident commission.

The victims included James J. Jorebeck, Portland, painter; Henry Realsbeck, Klamath Falls, laborer; Robert R. Yoakham, Remote, logger; Ralph C. Thomas, Reids, logger; Deibert Barr, Elsie, laborer; and Lloyd M. Tipton, North Bend, laborer.

There were a total of 857 accidents reported to the commission.

Helen's Dad Busy Filling Teeth as She Takes Crown

BERKELEY, Cal., July 5.—(AP)—The business of filling teeth went on as usual today in the office of Dr. C. A. Wills, despite the fact that his daughter, Helen, had just won her third consecutive British women's singles tennis championship at Wimbledon.

"Haven't much to say," Dr. Wills told the Associated Press. "Been too busy trying out my own strokes on molars. Naturally I expected Helen to win and to say I am pleased, is putting it mildly. Now my friends will have a chance to 'kick' me for another year about being the father of the great tennis player."

L. A. ATHLETIC CLUB WINNER

National A. A. U. Meet Closes; Doherty is Decathlon Champ

DENVER UNIVERSITY STADIUM, July 5.—(AP)—The forty-first running of the National A. A. U. track and field games came to a close today with the Los Angeles Athletic club taking home the relay championships and Kenneth Doherty of the Cadillac Athletic club of Detroit, Mich., retaining the decathlon championship with 7784.68 points, a new American record.

The Los Angeles club's 440 yard team of Milton Mattrer, Charley Paddock, Maurice Guy and Frank Wysock, created a new world's record for that event on a track with two turns, the time being 41 9-10 seconds. The old record was 42 4-10 seconds.

A new A. A. U. meet record of one minute, 26 4-10 seconds for the half mile relay was set by the Los Angeles team, the personnel of which was the same as that in

the R.R.P. The old record of one minute 27 4-10 seconds, had stood since 1921. The New York A.C.'s one mile quartet clipped 6-10 seconds from the former A. A. U. mark of 3 minutes 17 8-10 seconds, made in 1926 by the Illinois A. C.

Doherty's decathlon point total was the highest ever made in the United States. The previous high was 7574.42, made in 1927 at Lincoln, Neb., by Falt Elkins, of the University of Nebraska.

Herman Briz of the Los Angeles A. C. set a new world's record in the eight pound shot, throwing the ball 67 feet 11 inches in the medley event of 8, 12 and 16 pound shots. Ralph Rose made the old mark in 1907.

(Continued from Page 1.) sibly banking and finance, though there is some doubt about the latter selection.

The president has said that a man vested in major financial operations would be named to the board to give the benefit of his experience in handling the \$500,000,000 to be made available to the board. Since the selection of Alexander H. Legge, president of the International Harvester company, however, there has been a question whether he is to represent both finance and business and a second representative of cotton or wheat appointed.

Mr. Legge is to serve as chairman for the first year, at least. Of the other four members appointed, James C. Stone of Kentucky will represent the tobacco growers and serve as vice chairman; Carl Williams of Oklahoma City is to represent cotton; C. B. Denman of Farmington, Missouri, livestock; and C. C. Teague of Los Angeles, the fruit growers.

Secretary Hyde, the ninth member is to serve ex officio.
