PHONE CABLE IS CONSIDERED

Conference Scheduled Monday With Marion County Court Here

Next Monday representatives of the Portland Telephone & Telegraph Co. are expected here to confer with the county court regarding rights desired along county highways whereby the company will be entitled to bring its heavy line from Portland to Salem in an underground cable-way.

The telephone company a number of weeks ago applied to the court for the right to dig a ditch along the Boone's Ferry road from the Marion county line into Woodburn. From here the cable would go to the Southern Pacific right-of-way and thence into Salem.

The county court foresaw considerable difficulty in accepting the telephone company's proposal. It would mean that there would be a deep ditch dug alongside the roadway for a considerable distance and while this ditch would be entirely filled, the court feared a settling of the dirt, causing a bad ditch alongside the roadway. The court also set forth the objection that only a part of the Boone's Ferry road was definitely located and consequently changes in location would bring embarrassment to the telephone company.

Just what settlement will be made between the telephone officials and the county court is not at all certain. The telephone representatives insist that the construction of an underground cable line to Salem would afford this city and intermediate points between the capitol city and Portland the latest development in inter-city telephone service.

The county court has made it plain that it does not object in principle to the idea of a permit being granted the telephone company to bring its cable line along the highways of the county provided the rights of motorists and other users of the highways are preserved.

ROAD CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM IS PUSHED

With six crews working at full speed the market road construction program of the county court is in full swing, according to County Judge Siegmund. Due to the late spring season, work was held back for a number of weeks but now that suitable weather is at hand the county authorities are urging that as much of the 50 miles of improvement program as possible be finished as soon as is possible.

At least four market road projects are assured of completion this year with others likely to be completed before fall rains make further construction impossible. The independence ferry road, which construction has been under way for six weeks will be one of the first finished. Other roads which are to be completed include the so-called Siegmund road near Dayton, the Ankeny Hill-Buena Vista road and the Million-Dollar highway from Gervais to the Lake Labish district.

The last five miles into the springs are over a full width, well-graded road, differing but little from the standard forest development road.

The Brockman interests of Portland, who have leased what is generally known as the upper development, have spent 35,000 in building roads into the center of the hot springs district and in erecting buildings. The Brockmans have a city of 20 tents on one part of their holdings.

Cars at Breitenbush Springs on the day were from California, Utah, Nevada, Montana and Washington, and according to reservations made for cabins, the fame of the springs has already become known along the coast.

The Mill City stage which leaves Salem each morning at 10:30 o'clock reaches the springs at 2:30, o'clock. This with the ease of driving into the springs and the good roads all the way from Salem, has placed these famous springs within the reach of each. The distance to Detroit is 60 miles and then 12 miles into the springs, an easy drive of three hours.

The road from Detroit to Humbug Springs, seven miles, is a well graded forest route on the bed of the logging road of the Hammond Lumber company.

TAVARES, Fla., July 5.—(AP)—Chris Stephenson, veteran deputy sheriff, was charged with murdering Hovie Jenkins, an escaped convict, in a warrant issued today.

The charge was based on statements by the slain man's widow that she had been intimate with the deputy and that he was aiding her husband and two other convicts to flee the state when the shooting took place. Her statements, police said, were corroborated by Bessie Holland. The two women are charged with aiding in the slaying.

Stephenson told officers after Jenkins' body was found last week that he killed the convict while trying to arrest him.

The women said Stephenson had agreed to take Jenkins and his two companions, who had escaped the Port Pierce jail, to the Georgia line. While en route, however, he awakened in a side road and after ordering the women and the other two convicts to go down the road a bit, fired six shots into Jenkins' body.

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TEACHERS SEEK MORE FREEDOM

Power Trust Propaganda in Schools Decried in Resolution

CHICAGO, July 5.—(AP)—Teachers should not be kept in fear of losing their jobs because bobbed hair, dancing, smoking, short skirts, card playing, movies and matrimony are frowned upon by many school boards, the American Federation of Teachers asserted today in reaffirming its stand on academic freedom before adjourning their annual convention.

Just because women elect to teach is no reason why they should be subjected to restrictions on their personal lives not imposed upon women in other professions, the federation maintained.

W. B. Satterthwaite of Seattle, and E. E. Schwartztrauber of Portland, Ore., were among 11 vice presidents elected.

Declaring that "the power trust of American is seeking to use the public schools in order to spread propaganda against public ownership of public utilities," the federation went on record as "being unalterably opposed to all such efforts of the power trust to propagandize in the public schools or to censor texts to its advantage."

The resolution cited what is termed the "insidious efforts of the National Electric Light association and other agencies," which the resolution claimed, has been subsidizing professors to further their propaganda.

The only resolution turned down was one dealing with sex education. This resolution, which expressed disapproval of the New York courts for condemnation of the pamphlet prepared by Mrs. Mary Ware Bennett, was rejected because the federation was not familiar with the pamphlet.
