

Don Moe Gets Just One Under Par to Enter Quarter Finals

PORTLAND LAD SHOWING WELL

Brown Dog Furnishes Mental Hazard Without Affecting Ability

MISSION HILLS, Country Club, Kansas City, July 10.—(AP)—Don Moe, handsome, meticulous 19-year-old University of Oregon student from the Alderwood Country club, Portland, plays par golf—no matter what the handicaps. He entered the quarter finals of the 30th annual western amateur tournament under way on the Mission Hills course this afternoon after shooting one under par on the 28 holes he had to play in his first and second round matches, although obliged to battle rain, heavy fairways and treacherous greens.

As though this were not enough in the way of impediments he had to overcome the mental hazard of a brown dog that insisted upon standing in front of him when he drove. The dog was a faithful gallery member at the finish. Moe had conquered the course with two par 72 rounds for medalist honors in the qualifying rounds. The major upset of the tournament came in a second round match today when Art Sweet, golf writer from Chicago, defeated a former champion, Koot Carter, Oklahoma City, 4 and 2 after Carter had eliminated Chester Jones, University of Kansas student, 4 and 3 in a morning round. Middle western golfers predominate in the quarter final pairings tomorrow with Moe the only "outsider," and incidentally the favorite of the gallery. Moe is paired with another young man, Carey L. Bailey, Jr., 20 year old Kansas City boy, for the gruelling 36 hole battle which will truly test the merits of a golfer.

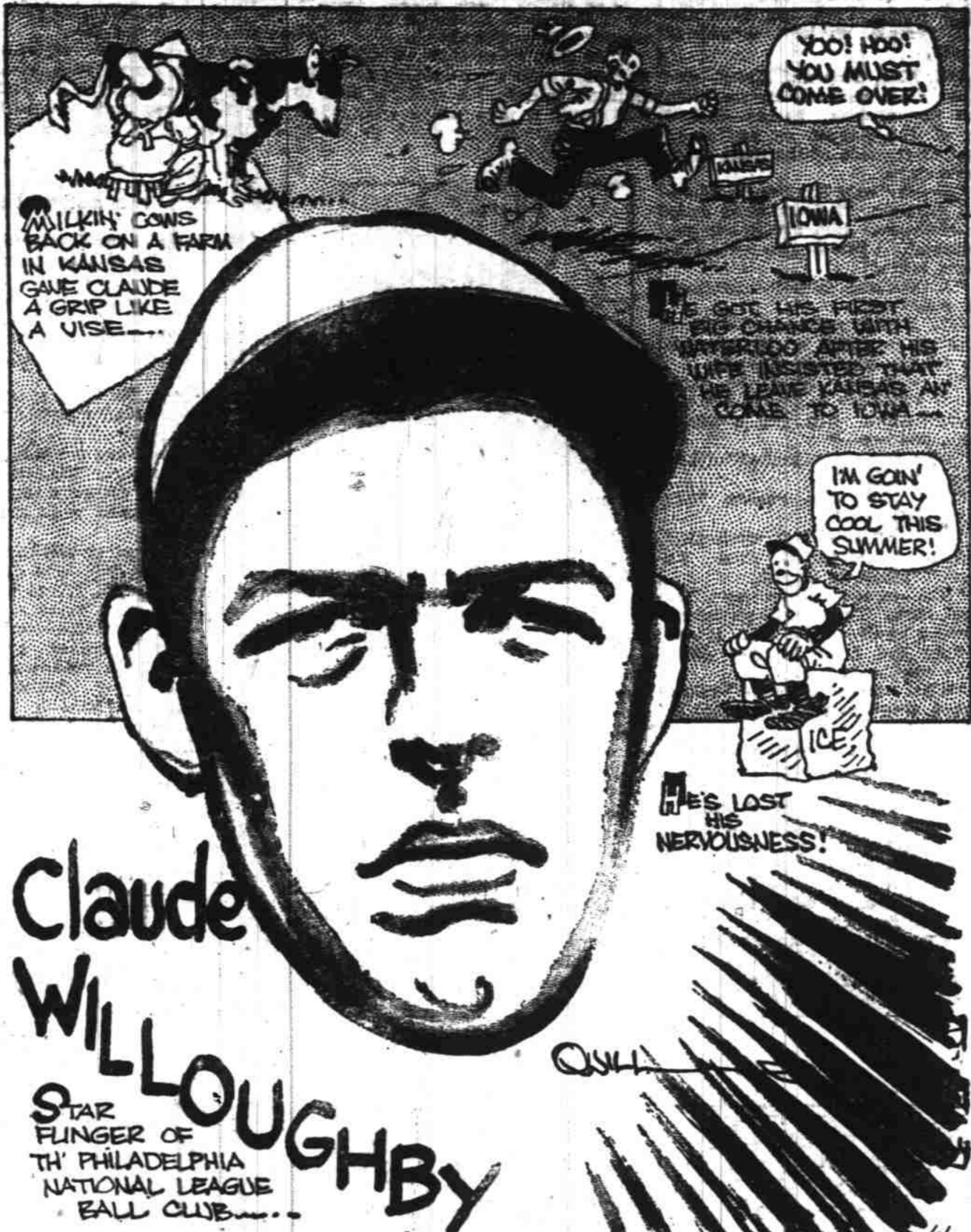
Cincinnati Knocks Out Win Easily
