

NORMAL WILL GRADUATE 92

Summer Session to Close With Graduation Exercises Wednesday

MONMOUTH, July 22.—A class of 92 members will be graduated from the Oregon Normal school Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock in the auditorium. Simple exercises will be held, with presentation of diplomas by Dean J. B. V. Butler, and music by the Normal symphonic orchestra directed by William Fredey Gaskins.

Another division will receive diplomas the last week in August, at the close of the summer term; making a total of about 450 completing the work in this school year.
