

# STOCK MARKET RISE IS UPSET

Pinch in Call Money Brings  
Drop in Prices on  
Wall Street

NEW YORK, July 24.—(AP)—Another forward movement on the stock market was upset by a pinch in call money today, and the list in general closed moderately lower, although a sprinkling of issues continued to advance.

Call loans renewed at 7 per cent, but was successively moved up to 8, then to 9. While this development had been foreshadowed by the recent firming of time money, it came as a surprise to many traders, after the frequently reiterated predictions of some weeks ago that money would ease up markedly during the latter part of the summer.

Some of the steels, rails, utilities and communications issues were bid up sharply. U. S. steel reached a new peak at 21 3/4, but closed at 20 1/2, off more than a point. American telephone was an outstanding strong stock, rising more than 8 points to a new top at 25 3/4, and closing within a fraction of the top. Boston and Maine climbed about 1 1/2 points to a new high price of 21 1/2, and Ohio and Erie reached new record levels. Some of the railway equipments were well bought. Poor & Co., reaching new high ground, and General American tank advancing in response to report that Goldman Sachs had purchased a large block. Worthwhile pump issues reached new highs on resumption of preferred dividends.

General Gas and Electric "A" was a strong spot in the utilities, rising more than 6 points across the 100 mark for the first time, in response to prospects of a split up and a more liberal dividend policy. Pacific lighting was also buoyant, rising more than 8 points to a new peak on merger prospects. Allied Chemical and General Electric sold up 6 and 7 points, only to lose their gains in the reaction.

Aviation stocks were under marked pressure. United, Wright and Curtiss losing 3 to 4 points. Several stocks sagged to new 1929 lows, including Gotham hosiery and St. Joseph lead, dropping most 14 points. Chesapeake and Ohio dropped 7 points, Canadian Pacific 8 and such shares as American can, American Water works, International Harvester, National Biscuit, Westinghouse Manufacturing and Montgomery Ward, some 3 points or more.

## CROPS IN VALLEY ARE DECLARED O. K.

Crops generally are good throughout the valley in the opinion of Henry Crawford of Salem whose work takes him about the county. Spring grain crops will be effected somewhat adversely by the late season which held back the wheat and oats and made the growing season unduly short. Winter grain this year will be an excellent crop in Crawford's opinion.

Prune men are feeling better than they have for years with prices reaching \$6 a pound for 30-35 sizes. This means at least 60 cents a pound for prunes and with orchards running from one to two tons to the acre the outlook is good for a strong return to the grower.

The cherry crop has been disappointing, says Crawford. When he went east recently on a trip to his old home in North Carolina, Mr. Crawford took back reports of a fine cherry crop but a heavy drop late in the season cut the yield down drastically.

## U. S. INSURANCE IS TO BE EXPLAINED

The privilege that has again been extended all veterans of the world war to take out government life insurance is explained in detail by Frank T. Hines, director of the United States Veterans' bureau, in an article that will appear in the August issue of the American Legion monthly. As director of the Veterans' Bureau, Hines is in direct charge of the government's insurance policy. In the article he stresses the value of insurance and the advantages offered veterans by taking out government policies.

"It will be real news to many service men, veterans of the world war—important news, too—that the right to obtain a United States government life insurance policy is still open to them, providing they are in good health," the article will say. "Congress on May 29, 1928, amended the World War Veterans' act extending indefinitely the period in which applications could be filed for government policies by those entitled to them. The privilege had expired on July 2, 1927, except for new entrants in the service. It is noteworthy that in the few months before this time limit expired approximately 250,000 men filed applications for policies."

She called the boys of another neighbor to extinguish the flame, but it was beyond control before they reached it.

The fire department was called but they were hopeless, there being no place to connect a hose. The only water near the house was that in a well at the back door. With buckets and tubs the men kept the woodshed from burning. Practically all the household goods were saved. "This is a hard blow for Mrs. Miller, her husband having died just a short time ago. The insurance on the house was small."

Mr. and Mrs. Kenagy are at the West home for the present and expect to spend their honeymoon later at Yellowstone national park.

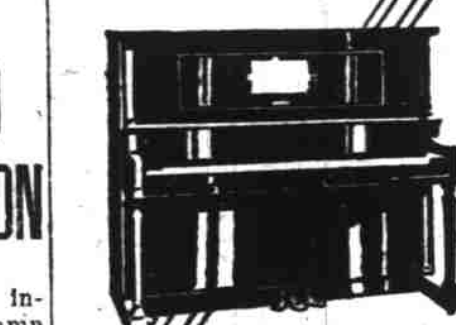
## MR. AND MRS. SIMON WORK ON PROGRAM
