D. S. C. GETS NEW JOURNALISM PROF

CORVALLIS, Ore., July 27.—(AP)—Charles D. Byrne, for four years head of the department of printing and rural journalism at South Dakota state college, has accepted the position as head of the department of industrial journalism at Oregon State college, President W. J. Kerr announced today. Byrne succeeds Prof. Maynard W. Brown who resigned to accept a professorship at Marquette university.

Professor Byrne is a University of Wisconsin honor graduate. He served as editor of a national dairy magazine and for two years was agricultural editor of Pennsylvania State college. He will take over his new duties here September 1.

Experience and training in agricultural and other forms of technical journalism fit Byrne unusually well for the position at the state college, here President Kerr declared.

ASSAULT LAID TO J. L. HARRIS

Justice Court Charge Preferred by Alice Harris Saturday

Charges of assault and battery were filed against J. L. Harris in justice court here Saturday by Mrs. Alice Harris, self-admitted common law wife of Harris who is said to have lived with him for the past eight years and to have been the mother of one child born to them.

According to the story told by Mrs. Harris she was very instrumental in providing the living for Harris and herself, doing all sorts of work to add funds to the family exchequer. Some time ago she separated from Harris and since that time has not fared so well.

Things came to a crisis recently when Harris demanded of his former companion that she provide him at once with \$21 to purchase a license for his truck. Failing to do this, Mrs. Harris is said to have been attacked by Harris and treated brutally. This led to her signing a complaint against him in justice court Saturday charging her former "husband" with assault and battery.

An anonymous letter written by Harris and signed "VIG COM" figures in the mixup between them and this letter was placed in justice court Saturday along with Mrs. Harris oral testimony.

The letter, in part, follows: "We understand a person by the name of Mrs. Alice Harris is staying at your place and is creating a good deal of talk about you and her conduct which is strictly against the laws of Oregon. We are giving Mrs. Harris twenty-four hours in which to leave this community.

"The charges are of a serious nature and if she does not leave before that time we will not be responsible for the action the community or the law may take.

"You had no right transporting this woman who is the wife of J. L. Harris from her place of residence to your place for immoral purposes.

"There may not be any more warnings of this until something happens.

"Be governed accordingly. "Vig. Com."
