Three Musketeers of Tennis

These three—LaCoste, Borotra and Cochet—aided and abetted by that most invincible of racquet-players, Father Time—were "The Big Four" that ended the reign of "Bill" Tilden and America's dominance of world tennis a couple of years ago.

This year, with the Davis cup matches being played, France is again in a most formidable position to retain international tennis honors, despite the absence of LaCoste, due to illness.

With Jacques Brugnon as "an ace in the hole" for France, Borotra and Cochet should win the Davis Cup for the third successive year unless a phenomenal upset occurs.

Wilmer Allison and Johnny Van Ryn defeated Cochet and Brugnon in the doubles at Wimbledon; but that affords only a faint ray of hope for Uncle Sam. The Davis Cup matches calls for four single matches and a doubles. To win the trophy, the Americans must win at least two of these single matches. At this writing, it is inconceivable that our U. S. boys—Hennessey, Lott, Van Ryn and Allison—have more than a ghost of a chance in the singles against any one of "The Three Musketeers."

Of the French aces, Rene LaCoste is rated "the big shot." Many critics insist that he is "look" Tilden when "Bill" was "good as ever" and that "LaCoste could have beaten the great American court star at any time in the latter's career." Tildentes scorn such an opinion, but they all concede this Frenchman to be one of the greatest of all tennis masters.

LaCoste did not compete at Wimbledon, but he has been practicing with methodical precision ever since early in May, devoting at least two hours a day to his favorite game. He is the almost perfect tennis mechanism—a finished exponent of exact play as was Gene Tunney in boxing and Horton Smith in golf. LaCoste may be brilliant in victory only on occasions; but he plays so that "he just can't lose" with a consistency equivalent almost to invincibility. Cochet and Borotra are not nearly as consistent as LaCoste but they have many dazzling moments—inspirational feats of play—that have piled up victories for themselves and France.

These "Three Musketeers" are so sportively and congenial that only from a national victory viewpoint does Uncle Sam envy them their glory. They are splendid fellows all—but your Uncle and a few millions of nieces and nephews would be delirious with joy if our Davis Cup team "kidd" should do the "impossible" and trump those French aces as "Bill" Tilden et al. could.

FEDERAL LAND BANK STATUS CRITICIZED

A phase of the three-day north-west real estate convention which closed here Friday holds particular interest for the farmer, and, according to local realtors who sat in the discussion, will bear fruit. The realtor dissatisfaction with the way the federal land bank situation is being handled at the Spokane center, which serves all of the northwest territory, flared up at the farm land conference Thursday morning and interest was so great that the conference discussion was continued into the early afternoon.

The federal land bank is cutting down on applicants for farm loans and in trying to handle resale of farms it takes over is destroying land values in many places besides failing to get results in farm property, the realtors asserted. Through the hard times, instead of consulting with and enlisting the aid of realtors, the bank has practically ignored them, it was also pointed out.

To the end that these conditions might be reached and cooperation between the bank and realtors for the betterment of the farmer be brought about, a committee was appointed to draw resolutions on the matter, the resolutions to be submitted to the executive committee of the association for further consideration. H. A. Dryer of Portland was named chairman of the committee.

CANADIAN PLAYER DOMINION CHAMP

TORONTO, Ont., July 27.—(AP)—The Canadian tennis singles tennis championship returned to the dominion today as Jack Wright No. 1 Canadian player brushed aside Frank Shields, of New York, in the final round 6-4, 1-6, 7-5.

Wright succeeds as title-holder Wilmer Allison of Texas, now in Europe with the United States Davis cup team. In the course of his triumphant march to the title he last held in 1927, Wright defeated two of the first ten ranking players of the United States. Shields is ranked No. 10 and John Doe, of Santa Monica, who bowed to Wright in the semi-finals yesterday, is No. 7 in the United States ranking.

Women Athletes Make 5 World Records at Meet

On Soldier Field, Chicago

CHICAGO, July 27.—(AP)—Five world records were tossed into the discard and one was equalled at Soldier field today, as the Illinois women's athletic club won the national women's A. A. U. track and field championship with a total of 31 points.

Betty Robinson of the I. W. A. C. America's only winner in the 1928 Olympic games provided the sensational performance of the meet, setting new world records in the fifty and one hundred yard dashes.

The slim, smiling Chicago girl who runs like a man, clipped one fifth of a second from her own fifty yard dash mark, sprinting the distance in .05 4-5. In the longer dash she broke the accepted mark of 11 2-5 seconds held jointly by herself and Helen Filkey Warren, a club mate, in the semi-final heat, by one fifth of a second and equalled the performance in the final.

Rena MacDonald, a member of the 1928 Olympic team accounted for two first places for the Boston swimming association and set one world mark. She won the eight pound shot put with a toss of 42 feet, 4 1/2 inches, to break the record of 40 feet, 4 1/2 inches set in 1926 by Lillian Copeland of Pasadena, Cal. she also won the discus with a throw of 118 feet 14 inches.

FRANCE LEADS BY 2 TO 1 NOW

Van Ryn and Allison Trounce Cochet and Borotra in Straight Sets

PARIS, July 27.—(AP)—France will have to wait another day to pour champagne into the Davis cup, the gleaming silver bowl that symbolizes world supremacy in tennis.

Hopeful of winning three straight matches, the Frenchmen sent their best doubles team of Henri Cochet and Jean Borotra onto the court today against the United States, but the singles conquerors of "Big Bill" Tilden and George Lott were soundly and smartly beaten by two American collegians, John Van Ryn and Wilmer Allison, the one from Princeton and the other from Texas, France needs but one more victory in two matches tomorrow, however, to keep the Davis cup for another year. America must win both to win back the trophy.

Ten thousand spectators packed the Roland Garros stadium to see Allison and Van Ryn triumph in double quick time by scores of 6-1, 8-6, 6-4.

LEO DIEGEL WINS IN CANADIAN OPEN

KANAWAKI, Que., July 27.—(AP)—Leo Diegel, who does nothing by halves in golf, won his fourth Canadian open championship today with a sensational gesture as even the theatrical Leo ever employed to win a title. An amazing 72 hole score of 274, topped off by a record equaling 66 in the final round, gave Leo the crown by a margin of three strokes. Tommy Emour taking the runner up place with 277.

A hectic struggle marked the final day in which 36 holes decided the competition. Leo led Armour by a stroke at the start of the third round and Tommy was a round in par 70.

In the afternoon there was nothing to choose between them for nine holes, each going out in 34 strokes, one under par. Leo picked up a stroke on the first three starting home. He bagged two birdies while Tommy's best was one. The champion then began to draw away and a birdie two at the short 17th left him with a chance to cut four strokes from par by scoring a par four at the home hole.
