

Mandell Whisked Away By Police To Avoid Foul Play

FIGHT SLATED FRIDAY NIGHT

Much Advertising Accrues to Benefit of Backers as Rumors Rife

CHICAGO, July 31.—(AP)—Sammy Mandell, who will defend his world lightweight boxing championship against Tony Canzone at Chicago stadium Friday night, was whisked away from his hotel by police tonight under guard as a precaution against possible violence of members of a purported gambling clique.

CHICAGO, July 31.—(AP)—Sammy Mandell, ready to make his third stand in defense of the world lightweight championship, and his dynamic challenger, Tony Canzone, finished training today for their 10 round title engagement in the Chicago stadium Friday night.

The champion, looking and acting the part of a fighter trained to perfection, pulled stakes at his hotel camp today, moving downtown to a gymnasium to go through whatever motions were considered necessary. He stepped through two spirited rounds with the gloves and breeched through light gymnasium exercises before ducking to the showers.

Canzone made it another afternoon of boxing at his garden of Allah camp, before letting down until ring time. He boxed six fast rounds, two apiece with a trio of sparring mates in his final workout with the gloves. He intends to remain out in the country until Friday morning, presumably to get a little more joy out of life and to escape the heat. He will not break camp until time to come into Chicago for the weighing-in Friday afternoon.

Paddy Harmon, president of the Stadium Corporation, regards the prospect of a sell out as rather bright. With a seating capacity of nearly 25,000, the stadium can do about \$145,000 worth of business. This Harmon indicates, is what the fight will draw. The advance sale, according to reports tonight, has exceeded \$30,000.

The only jarring note in Harmon's hope of a sell-out is the weather situation. A break in the hot spell is all that is needed, Harmon says, to bring out a capacity attendance.

OLD NET HERO IN SEMI-FINAL

Richard Norris Williams is in limelight after 15 Years Obscurity

SEABRIGHT, N. J., July 31.—(AP)—A glamorous tennis figure whose daring racket carried him to two national championships some 15 years ago came smashing through to the semi-finals of the Seabright tournament today.

Crushing Julius Seligson in straight sets by scores of 6-4, 6-4, Richard Norris Williams, 2nd, of Philadelphia, shared with John Doe, the Californian, Berkeley Bell, the Texan, and Norman Farquharson, the invader from South Africa, the honors of the day. Farquharson, only surviving contender, subdued Gregory Mangin, 9-7, 6-0, 6-4. Williams' hopes of J. Gilbert Hall of South Orange, N. J., 7-5, 6-3, and Bell had met all his own way in overwhelming the Japanese, Sadakazu Onda, 6-2, 6-3. But the achievement of the veteran campaigner, Williams, was many times the most impressive of the four.

Williams breaks through Seligson's service. Williams looked a winner when he broke through Seligson's strong service in the fifth game to lead at 3-2. Seligson's confidence he swept through the more games before Seligson braced, took two and cut Williams lead to 5-4.

In the pinch the old Davis cup hero came through magnificently. With Seligson serving the points well to 2-1, then Williams drove home two clean cut placements for the game and set a heart-breaking trap shot which the stocky Seligson could not reach and a zipping, cross court forehand drive, the second set was much the same story with Williams always holding the balance of power in his flashing net game and his harder-hit, faster dropping drives.

Farquharson was forced to play his best to win the first set from 5-6. After rolling up a lead of 4-1 and 5-2, he saw his young opponent square it at 5-all then frize ahead on a break through service at love.

CANNERY STARTED AT ASYLUM HERE

Salem has a new cannery. It is at the state hospital. That institution has always done more or less canning of fruits and vegetables. All the state institutions do—especially the penitentiary, which puts up great loads of prunes and other fruits.

But the state hospital has a real up-to-date cannery plant, with new equipment, installed in the industrial building which is in course of construction and will be fully finished and equipped within a month or six weeks; would be sooner excepting for the rush of work in harvest time and in other directions.

The new cannery at the state hospital is comparable to a well equipped one in a small town; as complete as far as it goes as the light bigger ones in Salem.

And it handles a wider range of fruits and vegetables than are turned out by our big ones. It uses tinned corn, strawberries, raspberries of both varieties, loganberries, pears, prunes, plums, and all the other fruits, and it goes into corn, bean and pea canning on a large scale comparatively, and also puts up some carrots and other vegetables, and makes a lot of jellies and jams. It does not stop strongly on gooseberries and loganberries. They take too much sugar.

Also, the state hospital has large storage capacity for all vegetables and fruits that can be kept over in this way. The institution has apples every day in the year, and in good condition, kept in storage.

The management aims to buy nothing in the way of fruits or vegetables that it is possible to grow here, and to store, can or preserve. Only a few tropical fruits are bought occasionally for special purposes, like dietary needs.

SCHMELING GO IS STILL IN AIR

Announcement of Bout With Sharkey Has no Effect on Promoters

DETROIT, July 31.—(AP)—Although definite announcement was made this afternoon by James (Bingo) Brown, chairman of the Michigan state boxing commission, that Jack Sharkey, the Boston Lithuanian, would meet Max Schmeling in a bout at Navy field September 19 under the auspices of Olympia arena, Detroit, fight promoters declined to say the fight would take place.

Dick Dunn, manager of Olympia declared he knew nothing about arrangements for the match "except what I read in the papers."

Floyd Fitzsimmons, who promoted the Dundee-Fields change of title in his new arena, at the Michigan state fair grounds July 25, came forward with a claim for Sharkey's services, explaining that a contract with the Boston sailor fight Pierre Charles, Belgian heavyweights here last fall, still was binding upon Sharkey, who was reported ill at the time of the scheduled match. Fitzsimmons' contract with Sharkey is dated August 23, 1928, and is filed at Lansing.

"Sharkey will have to fight for me before he can go through with the Schmeling fight," Fitzsimmons said.
