## Two Autoists Arrested for ettes by Highway

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5 .-(AP)-Forest rangers arrested two motorists for tossing lighted cigarettes from automobiles today and started a campaign to eliminate forest fire hazards which are believed to have started serious fires in Oregon and Washington forests.

So serious is the situation in the Chelan national forest in northern Washington that seven men, headed by F. H. Brundage, chief of fire control, were dispatched to the forest by airplane today. Ten fires of various sizes are burning in this forest, they reported, with one of them racing over 10,000 acres of yellow pine near Chelan lake

Although fire fighters have controlled the Deschutes forest fire near Bend, Ore., a strict watch is being maintained over campers and motorists. A telegram received at forest headquarters here today stated that lightning between August 1 and 2 had started 35

### Unique Automobile Is Seen at Keizer

KEIZER, Aug. 5.—After an extended visit at the Wm. Blake home, Mr. and Mrs. Jno, Blake and Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Watson and family left Monday for their home in Pasadena, California. They will visit Crater Lake going by way of Crescent City and

over the Redwood highway. They travel in two cars, one an enclosed Buick, the other a house on wheels. built on a Reo speedwagon chassis. On each outside are commodious lockers for provisions. It is also equipped with spare gasoline tanks. One bed form one side of

the car and is furnished with a good Simmon's spring and Sana Tuft mattress, as comfortable as any bed in the home. This is adjusted so that when open it rests just outside the car and is covered by a rain proof canopy. Another bed, for the children, fits right under this one, making an upper and lower berth.

On this side is also a cupboard. The other side of the car is fitted with a kitchen sink, draining board, builtins, clothes closet with mirror on the door and a large drawer for linens. Under the top over the seat is a suit ease locker large enough to hold six large suitcases.

Under the sideboard to the right of the sink, is an ice box, which holds 30 pounds of ice. Under the driver's seat is a 35 gallon tank for water which is brought up to the sink by a small hand pump. The cooking is done on a three burner pressure gasoline stove. The car is lighted by four electric lights from a battery.

This is a most unique and comfortable way of traveling with the modern conveniences that everyone desires. The arrangement was unique and well worth seeing.
