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RIVER TESTED BELOW ALBANY

Effect of Sewage Upon Fish Life Declared Negligible By O. S. C. Experts

ALBANY, Ore., Aug. 5.—(Special.)—The effect of Albany's sewage on the water of the Willamette river is not menacing to fish life, according to tests made by Oregon State college engineers, who are studying the river with a view to determining the extent of pollution in the river and its effect on fish life and public health.

Taking samples from the river at a point four miles below Albany's sewer outlets, the engineers discovered the water well saturated with oxygen, in fact has almost as high a content of oxygen as the samples taken above Albany. The maximum reading from the water tested four miles below town was 8.7 parts oxygen to every million parts of water, as compared with 9.9 parts oxygen to every million of water tested upstream from Albany, unpolluted by Albany sewage.

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HOP GROWERS GROUP PICKED

President Louis Lachmund Of State Organization Selects Committee

Appointment of a committee of 12 hop growers to conduct a study and determine whether a permanent Oregon hop growers association is desirable in this state, was announced here Monday by Louis Lachmund, Mr. Lachmund was elected temporary president at a preliminary meeting of growers held here last Saturday.

In case the committee finds that a permanent organization is desirable, it will recommend for or against affiliating with the American Hop Growers association. The report of the committee will be submitted to the growers at a meeting to be held in Salem prior to September 1.

Members of the committee are: Louis Lachmund, F. K. Needham, Henry Cornoyer, Frank W. Durbin and T. A. Livesley, all of Salem; Dean Walker, Mike Walker, Donald McCarty and Douglas Cohen, Independence; Ross Wood, McMinnville; Father Joseph Mount Angel, and Henry L. Bents of Newberg.

The association, if organized permanently, will oppose legislation unfavorable to the hop industry, seek an increase of the tariff on hops, and disseminate valuable information among the hop growers.

GENEVA, Aug. 5.—(AP.)—The world federation of education associations concluded its third biennial conference here Saturday. Augustus O. Thomas of Augusta, Me., was reelected president and Charles H. Williams, Columbia, Mo., was named secretary.
