

CONFAB STILL IN DEADLOCK

British Representative Refuses to Accept Conditions of Plan

THE HAGUE, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Philip Snowden, British chancellor of the exchequer, resumed his drive for modification of the Young plan today and a crisis in the conference was only averted by adjournment until Monday when a showdown is expected.

"The situation was so grave tonight that the allied delegates found it expedient to confer at 11 p. m. tomorrow as to a future line of action. Premier Briand of France, Premier Jaspard of Belgium, Senator Mosconi of Italy, and M. Adachi of Japan met at the Briand apartment and went over the whole situation to see what could be done and what course should be taken in case the British delegates remain obstinate when the financial committee meets again Monday."

W. Graham Gives Britain's Stand

"The day began with a speech by W. Graham, president of the British Board of Trade, setting forth how the British economic situation was adversely affected by deliveries in kind and how it was keeping a great many English working men idle."

The financial committee heard the plea of the president of the board of trade that payments of reparations in kind be reduced to the lowest possible limit.

The fact that Chancellor Snowden's resolution for revision of the young plan meanwhile had been allowed to remain on the table without mention apparently produced better feeling which lasted only until Chancellor Snowden rose to reply to M. Cheron in blunt and energetic language.

British Chancellor Grows Sarcasm

The British chancellor of the exchequer told the committee that he must not forget his resolution for revision of the Young plan on which he would demand action without much further ado.

"It is time we came to grips on this whole situation," he declared. Then turning to Finance Minister Cheron he questioned the figures which the French minister had produced to show that France was making as much greater sacrifice as the British. He contended that his day's discussion was to have been devoted to the question of reparations in kind and that M. Cheron's remarks regarding the comparative sacrifices of Great Britain and France were out of order.

Churchill Got Promise From Poincare, Claim

He said that former Premier Poincare in 1928 had made the promise to Winston Churchill, then chancellor of the exchequer, that the Spa percentages for the division of reparations would not be changed.

"The honor of at least one country is involved in this," the chancellor said. Turning to Italy, he declared that Alberto Pirelli, Italian delegate, also had made a similar promise to Sir Austin Chamberlain, former British foreign secretary. Signor Pirelli denied this, whereupon the chancellor remarked, "It is a pity the minutes were not kept on the conversation."

The rest of the financial committee appeared somewhat startled by this time and the hopes based on the quiet opening of the session appeared to be blasted.

3 SWISS AVIATORS ARE UNHEARD FROM

LE BOURGET, France, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Disappearance of the three Swiss aviators who left here on Thursday supposedly for Lisbon tonight was as puzzling as ever. Nothing had been heard of them since they started on what was announced as the preliminary to a transatlantic attempt.

It was hoped that they had been merely forced down in some out of the way place and had not thought it necessary to notify anyone. Had there been a serious accident it was believed that word of it would have reached Paris or Switzerland, unless, of course, they fell in the sea and were lost.

LISBON, Portugal, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Military observers tonight were inclined to believe that the Swiss aviators who left Le Bourget on Thursday for this city had met with an accident while crossing the Pyrenees or perhaps had fallen into the sea in attempting to reach the Azores.

The French crew of the transatlantic plane Yellow Bird, who are now visiting here, said tonight they doubted whether such a long flight as a transatlantic hop could be made in the type of monoplane chosen by the Swiss.

Mary Chaney Gives Ideals Of Auxiliary After Being Elected as Its President

"To strive in every way possible to be a real auxiliary to the American Legion, to aid them in all of their great work, will be the major effort of the legion auxiliary during the coming year," were the words of Mary Chaney, newly elected president of the auxiliary of Oregon.

An instructive rather than a critical program of Americanism will be the policy of the Oregon auxiliary during the coming year. Americanism will be stressed as a major activity of the auxiliary. The tribute which was paid to Mrs. Chaney at the time of her unanimous election to the presidency is proof of the loyalty to her which the members of the auxiliary feel. With her personality and this great loyalty every member of the department hopes for a great year for the Oregon department.

FIGHT FOR ESTATE NOW IN HIGH COURT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—(AP)—A fight for several million dollars in personal property left by Mark Hopkins, who died in San Francisco in 1878 which has been waged for several years in California courts has reached the supreme court.

Normal Lee Freeman in behalf of himself and others claiming to be heirs of Hopkins has asked the highest tribunal to review the decision of lower federal courts dismissing a suit he filed in February 1927, seeking distribution of part of the estate, he asserted had been fraudulently concealed.

Moses Hopkins was serving as administrator when the estate was distributed in November, 1883, between himself and Mary Frances Sherwood Hopkins, the widow, with approval of the probate court in San Francisco.

Freeman claimed that in July, 1925, he accidentally discovered that several million dollars of personal property and assets belonging to the estate had been fraudulently concealed and not distributed.

He asked the federal district court to order its distribution among heirs at law, charging that the property had been hidden to defraud the heirs. He insisted that as it had not been listed by Moses Hopkins, administrator, and had not been included in the distribution order of the probate court in 1883, it should go to the heirs at law.

PROHIBITION MEN ARE DENIED RIFLES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(AP)—A ban against the use of rifles by prohibition agents except in sparsely settled or mountainous sections is planned by Commissioner Doran in an effort to reduce the number of prohibition fatalities.

The prohibition commissioner, in announcing the plan today, said it was intended as a safety move to keep down the number of deaths in enforcing the law and to prevent possible killing of innocent persons from long range rifles. Under this decision, enforcement agents in settled communities will have to depend for protection upon service revolvers, but in mountainous and sparsely settled sections they will continue to use rifles.

No formal order will be issued, Doran said, but he will discuss the matter by correspondence with the administrators.

Reports to the prohibition bureau show that since the law went into effect 142 persons have been killed by prohibition agents and 55 enforcement officers have lost their lives. These figures do not include fatalities among the border patrolmen, who are not under the prohibition bureau.

GRAF ZEPPELIN MAKES RECORD

Giant Liner of Air Finishes Jaunt Across Ocean in Under 56 Hours

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Taking a new record for a trans-Atlantic dirigible crossing into her hangar with her, the great airship Graf Zeppelin reached home this afternoon 56 hours and 24 minutes after leaving Lakehurst on the first stage of her globe-girdling flight.

A small army of mechanics and helpers immediately began to groom the Zeppelin for the next stage to Tokyo, on which she will leave within three or four days.

Dr. Hugo Eckener celebrated his 61st birthday by bringing down the silver queen of the air at 1:02 p. m. with a journey of 4,200 miles to his credit in the log books. The Zeppelin made an average speed of 75 miles an hour for the entire trip, cutting the time for her crossing in 1928 by 13 hours and 22 minutes.

Home Port Gets Genuine Thrill

Friedrichshafen which is used to thrillers connected with Zeppelins, had the sensation of its existence when the Graf Zeppelin breezed in almost before the citizens were aware of it.

The airliner described a graceful curve over the city and in less than half an hour after she had been first sighted, came to the grounds in one of the prettiest and cleanest landings Dr. Eckener has ever achieved.

Within another half hour the passengers were out of the gondola and the freight was being unloaded.

Radio Speaker Announces Record

Before the thousands of spectators who thronged the aviation field and stood outside the fences could realize what had really happened the radio announcer's voice informed them that the Graf had shattered all previous dirigible records for the Atlantic crossing.

All Friedrichshafen was jubilant tonight over the Zeppelin achievement. But there was no happier man among them than Hugo Eckener himself. Although the Graf's commander kept his joy pretty much to himself and declined to show himself anywhere to celebrate his birthday or the Zeppelin's feat, evidence was not wanting from the Eckener home that he was delighted at having made the crossing in less than 56 hours.

Everything Found In Perfect Order

Within two hours after the Graf Zeppelin landed nothing at the Zeppelin plant gave evidence of an unusual occurrence. Mechanics busied themselves with the motors only to find they were in perfect condition. According to Director Maybach "not a single one needed to be replaced or overhauled. They stood the strain excellently and merely need oiling and cleaning."

Examination of the hull revealed no tears, so that from this technical point the takeoff for Tokyo could be made Tuesday night. However, Dr. Lennartz, the Zeppelin's blue gas expert, doesn't consider the takeoff likely before Wednesday or Thursday morning.

"Considering the enormous stretches ahead," he said to the Associated Press correspondent, "I know Dr. Eckener will want his men above all to have rest. They will be shot to pieces if they must start right off again by Tuesday morning."

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—(AP)—A clash between the living over the dead resulted Friday in the fatal shooting of Stanley Zasadzinski, 26, a striking grave digger of Calvary cemetery.

Zasadzinski was shot by Philip Nunziato, cemetery foreman, when a group of pickets charged a bus loaded with substitute workers, who were being transported within the cemetery's walls.

As the strikers advanced, throwing bricks and stones, Nunziato fired into them, he was arrested on a charge of homicide when Zasadzinski fell, fatally wounded.

This incident, along with reports that three substitute workers were badly beaten Sunday when they attempted to enter the Queens burial plot, moved peace makers today to hurry efforts to end the strike.

The services of Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, who offered to serve as arbiter in the controversy, were refused by the strikers who called him a "financier" and declared that they must be represented by "someone from the working class."

Strike demands include recognition of the cemetery workers union and an increase in salary.

STOCK MARKET TAKES REBOUND

Top-Heavy Speculative Situation Corrected by Recent Drop

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—(AP)—Prices rebounded sharply in a dull two-hour session on the stock market today. Yesterday's torrent of selling appeared completely to have swept out weak holdings, for the moment at least. Traders who had sold short, hastened to cover their commitments, and were forced to do so at rapidly rising prices.

Several brokers states that yesterday's reaction had to a marked degree corrected a rather top-heavy speculative situation caused by the rapid advance during June and part of July. Whether the reaction had run its course, however, was a moot question. Several commission houses advised their customers to keep out of the market until it reaches a more settled state, pointing out that a secondary reaction of a violent nature may reasonably be expected and that probable rate increases by other reserve banks would impair confidence.

Other prominent items were announcement that Class 1 railroad cleared aggregate net earnings in the first half of the year about percent above that for 1928; F. W. Dodge corporations compilation showing building contracts east of the Rockies increased 20 per cent in July to the second largest monthly total on record, most of the increase being in Public Works and Utility building; and announcement that Nash had followed Studebaker and Packard in cutting prices.

Atchison led the recovery in the rails, rising about 10 points to a new high record at 278, while C. & O., D. & H., New York Central, Union Pacific and Canadian Pacific rose 4 to 6 points. American tobacco was a strong feature, climbing about 3 points to a record level. Auburn auto regained yesterday's loss with a rebound of 20 points, and such shares as U. S. Steel, General Electric, Consolidated Gas, American Water Works, Johns American, National Biscuit, Johns Manville, Packard and Wright rallied 4 to 8 points. Among the isolated soft spots, Midland States Products preferred tumbled 7 points.
