Drum Corps Contest Friday to Draw From Entire Valley

Dramatic Event, **Contest to Come** At Local Field

Corps Coming From all Parts of State; Close **Competition Predicted for Big** Annual Contest


Unquestionably the most dramatic event of the busy three-day convention will be the state drum corps competition which will be held Friday night on Olinger field where fully 7000 people are expected to witness a dozen corps from all parts of the state vie for \$200 in cash awards and five much coveted trophy cups, each of which spell distinction for the post which receives them.


Promptly at 7 o'clock the exercises at Ollinger field will be under way with a band concert by the Legion organization from Albany and the 182nd Infantry band from Portland. When the drum corps start their parade shortly thereafter a a colorful spectacle never before witnessed in Salem will be on in full swing.

With their place decided by lot. corps after corps from the various posts of Oregon will march in perfect ranks while the drum mafor sets a cadence at which inspiring maneuvers will be executied. At least three pieces are to be played by each corps, and under the rules of the contest, two of the pieces must be played while the legion corps are in motion. Men Nattlly Dressed
