Fine Grain Crops On Auburn Farms

AUBURN, Aug. 15.—William Kropkin is making his annual round with his threshing machine this week. Several of the farmers having small acreages of grain, stacked together.

Conie Newbill's wheat produced 50 bushels to the acre, and his brother Cosper Newbill, while having only three-fourths of an acre of full sown oats, got a yield of 35 sacks or about 95 bushels. This place was badly hurt by frost, so that early this spring he disposed of it as even being worth cutting.

The secret of the good yield being that it started very heavily, as many as 54 straws coming from a single root. The average height of the grain was over five feet.

"Grandma" came to Oregon from Canada when she was six years old with her folks, her father, Lucious Gagnon being the ninety-first person to claim land from the government. He was a Hudson Bay man, a trapper and hunter. Her first husband whom she married when she was fifteen years old was Pierre dePot, and her second husband was J. P. S. deGobin, who has been dead for 33 years.

Victim of Auto Accident on Mt. Hood Loop Is Buried With Honors
