What's in a batting order?

Men who study baseball are all agreed that the first man up ought to be a player who gets on base, no matter how. The second man should be able to sacrifice, and the heavy artillery should be in third, fourth and fifth places, with the banner slugger up fourth.

That's fine for the first inning, but what about the rest of the game? Your leadoff man from then on may be anybody, or so it looks just on casual glance. If your pitcher happens to come up first, then he has to be able to get on, and if so, the regular leadoff man becomes the sacrifice man. And if the seventh man leads off, the catcher is supposed to sacrifice and the pitcher is called upon for the long hit.

Actually it isn't so. In forty or more games that we have scored in the last two seasons, the leadoff man—the man who heads the batting order—has started more than twice as many innings as anybody else.

Laugh that off if you like, it's so. Next in order comes the fifth man in the batting order, and next to him the sixth. The third man on the list starts the fewest innings.

Spec Keene tells his coaching students that the fifth man up ought to be the second leadoff man, and our figures bear that out. But in the major leagues now they're claiming the sixth man starts the inning oftener, next to the first man, so they put a man in sixth place who has leadoff qualifications.

Of course there's a reason for everything. Our theory is this: With a batting order top heavy, as is universally recommended, the ordinary result is one good inning and one poor one at bat. A good inning, if not too good, will average up five men at bat; a poor one, if not too poor, will average four men at bat. So the leadoff man comes to bat oftener. His chances are aided by the traditional weakness at bat of pitchers. And the sixth man is most likely to start the odd inning.

But that's only a tendency, so the third man on the list starts an average of one inning per game. The leadoff man starts four, and the fifth or sixth man two.

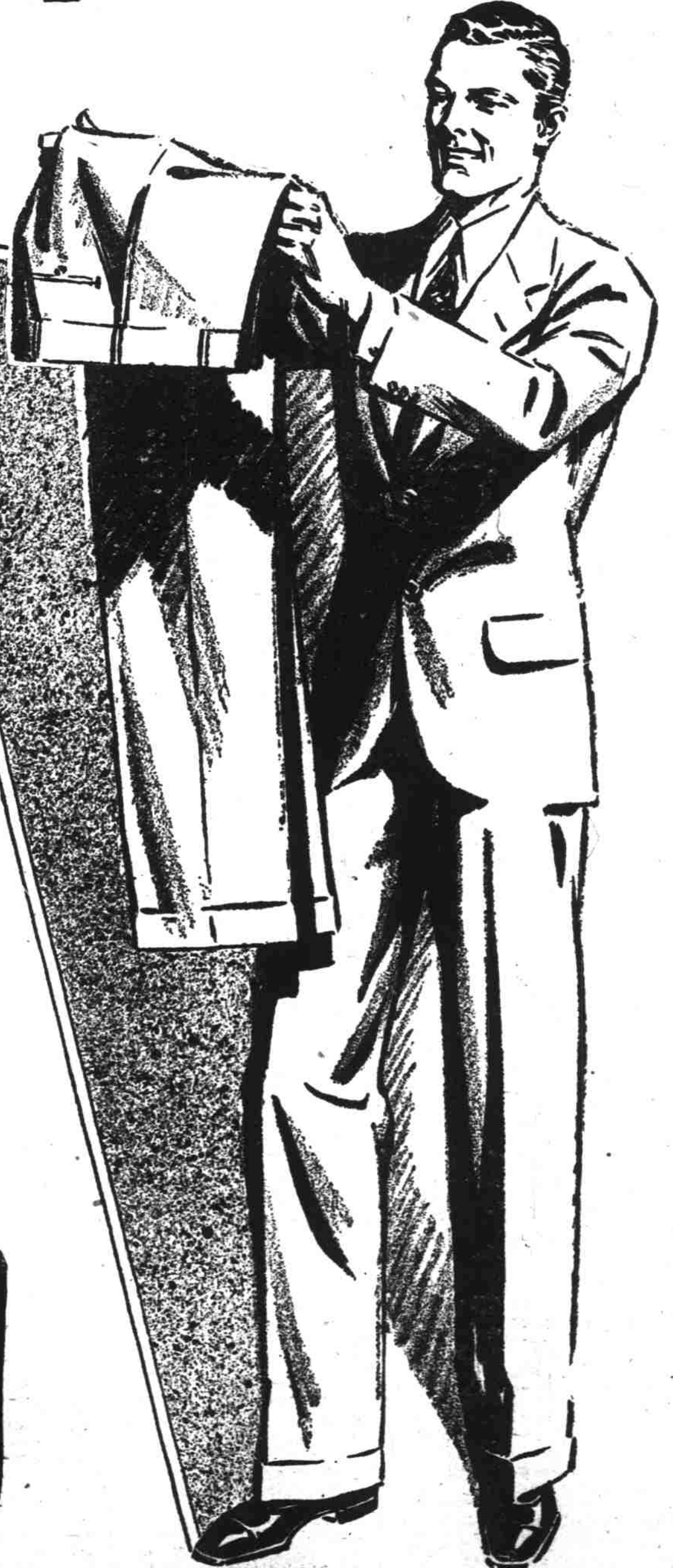
